Today's Game

The Flames (7-2, 4-0 BSC) take to the road for their final regular-season road game of the year on Saturday, as Liberty travels to Conway, S.C., to face Coastal Carolina (4-5, 3-1 BSC). The contest will help determine the league's 2010 champion and the winner of the conference's first-ever automatic bid to the NCAA FCS Playoffs.

Series Summary

Today's game will mark the eighth meeting in the series between the two programs since Coastal Carolina started its football program in 2003. Liberty won the first meeting and the three most recent match-ups to hold a 4-3 edge in the overall series.

Last Time at the Beach

The last time Liberty made the trek to Conway, S.C., the Flames won 43-38 over the Chanticleers on Oct. 4, 2008, in a game that saw the two teams combine for 1,065 total offensive yards. Liberty is 1-2 all-time at Brooks Stadium, with the last two meetings being decided by less than a touchdown.

Less Means More

The two teams combined for 1,065 total offensive yards the last time Liberty visited Brooks Stadium and defeated Coastal Carolina, 43-38, on Oct. 4, 2008. However, it might have been one yard Liberty did not pick that that sealed the road win. In a back-and-forth game, Liberty's Rashad Jennings broke free and found an open field on a third-and-two play from the Coastal Carolina 32-yard line.

But instead of scoring what would have been his fourth touchdown of the game, Jennings took a knee at the one-yard line and Liberty was able to wind down the clock and move to 5-0 on the season.

Nice in November

During the last five years, Liberty has finished strong under head coach Danny Rocco. The Flames have posted a 12-2 record in games played during the month of November and have outscored opponents by an average of 18.71 points per game during those contests (534 PF/272 PA).

Winning Ways

Last year, Liberty finished the season with an 8-3 record, marking its fourth-straight season with a winning record. The previous record was three-consecutive winning seasons from 1988-90 (1988 – last year under Morgan Hout, 1989-90 – first two years under Sam Rutigliano). With seven wins this season through nine games, Liberty is guaranteed to have its fifth winning season in a row, which extends the program record.

Sensational Seniors

This year's senior class has quickly erased last year's graduating class's program record. The 2009 squad finished their careers on Liberty Mountain with a 32-13 record. Through nine regular season games in 2010, this year's senior class has posted a 33-10 record during their four-year careers and they still have two regular season contests remaining to add to their new program record.

Four in a Row

For the fourth season in row, Liberty has opened Big South Conference play with a 4-0 mark. The Flames are the first team in league history to accomplish this feat.

On a Roll

Liberty will be looking to become the first program in Big South Conference history to start league play with a 5-0 record in three-straight season. The Flames finished the 2008 campaign with a perfect 5-0 record and won its first five games in 2009 before suffering a road lost at Stony Brook in both program's regular-season finales.

Tough at Home

Liberty will enter its final regular-season home game of the year against Stony Brook on Nov. 20 having won its last 11 home Big South Conference contests. The last time that Liberty lost a home Big South game was on Oct. 21, 2006, to Gardner-Webb, 27-24, one of only three conference losses under head coach Danny Rocco. During the 11-game streak, which is a conference record, Liberty has outscored its opponents by an average of 30.18 points per game (500 PF/168 PA).

Record-Setting Crowd

Liberty re-opened Williams Stadium on Oct. 2 in front of a record-setting crowd, as 19,314 fans saw the Flames defeat Savannah State, 52-14. The evening marked the grand re-opening of the facility that now seats 19,200 (expanded from 12,000). The previous single-game attendance record was 16,112 set against North Carolina Central, last year.

Snapping the "Sellout" String

Liberty played its annual Homecoming contest in front of 18,587 fans, which was the largest Homecoming crowd in program history. However, with the expansion of Williams Stadium, which now seats 19,200, Liberty did not fill the stadium beyond capacity for the first time in eight games. Prior to this year's Homecoming contest, the last time Liberty did not fill its on-campus facility beyond capacity was on Nov. 22, 2008, when Liberty completed a 10-win season with a 26-3 victory over No. 12 Elon in front of 7,751 fans.

Noting This Year's Numbers

An expanded Williams Stadium has allowed Liberty to continue its trend of nationally ranked attendance figures in 2010. Liberty currently ranks No. 7 nationally in average home attendance (18,114), No. 17 in filling stadium capacity (94.34 percent) and No. 22 in total home attendance (54,342).

Oh What a Run

Following a 40-14 home victory against Gardner-Webb last weekend, Liberty has posted a 20-3 record under head coach Danny Rocco against Big South teams since he took over the program in 2006. Liberty's three Big South losses under Rocco have come by a combined eight points. Liberty lost two Big South games during Rocco's first season, falling to Coastal Carolina (28-26/10-28-06) and Gardner-Webb (27-24/10-21-06), and dropped the 2009 season finale at Stony Brook (36-33/11-21-09).

Road Warriors

The Flames are coming off back-to-back road victories, giving Liberty three wins away from Lynchburg in 2010. Since head coach Danny Rocco took over the program in 2006, Liberty has posted a 14-11 record in games away from Williams Stadium. During the six seasons prior to Rocco's arrival, Liberty posted a combined 4-30 record in road games to open the fourth decade of Liberty football.

Trying to be the First

Liberty continues the 2010 season trying to become the first program in Big South history to win four conference titles in a row. Coastal Carolina and Liberty have each won three-straight titles. The Chanticleers won outright titles in 2004 and 2006, while sharing the title with Charleston Southern in 2005. Liberty won outright titles in 2007 and 2008, before sharing the conference crown with Stony Brook, last season.

Second and Climbing

Entering today's match-up with Coastal Carolina, Liberty is now 39-15 under head coach Danny Rocco. Liberty's win against Ball State on Sept. 11 pushed the five-year head coach past Tom Dowling for second place on Liberty's all-time coaching wins list, as Dowling finished his seven years as head coach with a 33-38-2 record (1977-83). Liberty's all-time winningest coach is Sam Rutigliano, who posted a 67-53 record during 11 years with the program (1989-99).

Two Touchdowns from Perfection

The Flames are 7-2 on the season, with each of their losses coming by a one-touchdown margin. Liberty's 30-23 decision on the road to Robert Morris on Sept. 18 on a touchdown with 22 seconds left in the contest. The following weekend, the Flames dropped a defensive struggle between a pair of Top 25 programs, when then No. 3 James Madison downed No. 22/21 Liberty, 10-3, in Harrisonburg, Va., in a game that saw a combined 547 yards of total offense.

Still on the Move

Following a fifth-straight victory, Liberty moved up two spots in the Sports Network poll and another spot in the FCS Coach listing. Liberty is now ranks No. 12 in the Sports Network/Fathead.com FCS Top 25 ranking and No. 11 in the FCS Coaches poll.

Nearing a Program Record

Liberty's current No. 11 ranking in the latest FCS Coaches poll is the fourth-best ranking in program history and the highest since 1990. Liberty opened the 1989 season with a 6-0 record and was ranked No. 11 before its 37-18 victory over Towson State and No. 9 before traveling to UCF. The following year, Liberty won its first four games and was ranked No. 9 before defeating Morehead State, 42-13, and a program-best No. 8 before facing Villanova.

A Rankings Review

Dating back to the second week of the 2008 season, Liberty has been ranked inside the Top 25 for 32 out of the last 40 weekly polls (including preseason and end of the year rankings). Following their victory over Glensville State on Sept. 6, 2008, The Flames jumped into the Top 25 at No. 25 and remained there the rest of the season. Liberty was in and out of the polls in 2009, as the Flames received a Top 25 billing in nine of the 13 polls released last season.

Needing a Push

Liberty has scored 400 or more points in the last three seasons, including a program-high 469 points in 2007. If Liberty wants to surpass the mark again, the Flames will need to post a few higher-scoring games during its last three regular-season events. Liberty is averaging 35.11 points per game, which has the Flames on pace to score 386 points during the regular season in 2010.

Defending Their Own House

Under head coach Danny Rocco, the Flames have won 24 out of 28 home games. Liberty has won 85.7 percent of its home contests under the skipper, who is in his fifth year at the helm of the program. Liberty was 4-2 under Rocco at home in 2006, a perfect 6-0 in 2007, 6-1 under Rocco in 2008 and 5-1 on Liberty Mountain in 2009. Liberty is 3-0 in home games this season, where the Flames have outscored their opponents 136-48 (Note: Liberty's season opener at City Stadium against St. Francis, Pa., is considered a neutral game).

Offensive Explosion

Under first-year offensive coordinator Brandon Streeter, a younger Liberty squad surprised many around the country, as the Flames led all FCS programs in scoring in 2009. Liberty finished the season with 400 points scored, which ranked No. 1 in the nation in FCS scoring offense (36.36). Liberty has reached the 400-point mark the last three years, including the 2007 season where they finished with a program-best 469 points scored.

Fifty is Nifty

Liberty re-opened Williams Stadium in grand fashion on Oct. 2, as the Flames thrilled the record-setting crowd with a 52-14 victory over Savannah State. The offensive burst marked the ninth time that Liberty has scored 50 or more points in five seasons under head coach Danny Rocco and the fourth-straight game at Williams Stadium that the Flames had exceeded the 50-point scoring mark. Liberty had the string snapped on Oct. 9 in a 44-20 victory over Charleston Southern.

The Points are Back

After failing to score a touchdown for just the second time under head coach Danny Rocco in a 10-3 setback at No. 3 James Madison, the Flames have quickly rebounded during their latest five games. Liberty has scored a combined 211 points in its last four outings (52 against Savannah State, 44 against Charleston Southern, 41 against VMI, 34 against Presbyterian College and 40 against Gardner-Webb). Liberty now ranks No. 9 nationally in scoring offense, as the Flames are averaging 35.11 points per game.

Racking it Up for Rocco

Head Coach Danny Rocco has brought a high-powered offense to Liberty, as the Flames have scored an average of 34.1 points per game since Rocco took over the program. The figure ranks 7.5 points per game ahead of the next highest scoring average under any other coach in program annals, as Sam Rutigliano's crew was able to score 26.7 points per game during his 11-year tenure.

A Decisive Number

The Flames' prolific offense in 2009 had Liberty atop the national statistical category of scoring offense. The team led the nation in scoring offense by averaging 36.36 points per game. Liberty has had a Top 20 scoring offense the last three years, as the Flames ranked No. 19 in 2008 (33.67) and No. 3 in 2007 (42.64). The 30-point mark seems to be the key number for a Flames victory, as Liberty is 31-2 under head coach Danny Rocco when Liberty scores more than 30 points in a game. The Flames are 8-13 under Rocco when Liberty fails to reach the 30-point threshold.

Don't Forget About the "D"

Despite Liberty's gaudy offensive numbers over the past three seasons, the Flames' defense has played a significant factor in the team's success, bringing a smile to head coach Danny Rocco's face, as he is a 20-plus year defensive coaching veteran. Since 2006, Liberty has held its opponents to an average of 18.52 points per game, bolstered by Rocco's first season when the Flames allowed a program-record low 172 points (15.6 points per game, which ranked No. 12 nationally in scoring defense).

Two Touchdown Favorites

Since taking over the program in 2006, head coach Danny Rocco's Flames have outscored their opponents by an average of 15.70 points per game. Liberty has scored 1,848 points (34.22 average points per game), while allowing 1,000 points (18.52 average points allowed per game).

Location, Location, Location

The common quote is not just limited to real estate, as the location of a game for the Flames is relevant to their scoring success, as well. In 28 home games under head coach Danny Rocco, Liberty is outscoring its opponents by 23.89 points per game (38.82 PF-14.93 PA), as compared to a slim 4.56 advantage in 25 road games (28.36 PF-23.80 PA) - (Note: Liberty's home opener for the 2010 season was played at Lynchburg's City Stadium and is considered a neutral game)

Fourth Quarter Friendly

Liberty held a 16-14 edge over Charleston Southern heading into the final 15 minutes of play on Oct. 16. However, the Flames' offense came alive during the fourth quarter, outscoring Charleston Southern, 28-6. Last year, the Flames outscored Big South foes 97-43 in the fourth quarter and 150-53 during the second half. This year, Liberty is outscoring Big South opponents 41-27 in the fourth quarter and 65-34 in the second half.

Running with the Flames

The Flames have been one of the nation's top FCS rushing programs over the past eight seasons, as Liberty has ranked among the Top 30 rushing teams in the nation seven out of the last eight years. During the span, the Flames have surpassed the 2,000-yard mark six out of eight years and have averaged 2,138 rushing yards per season. Last year, Liberty just missed the mark, rushing for 1,937 yards, but still managed to finish the year ranked No. 21 in the country in rushing offense (176.1 yards per game).

Rushing Attack is Back

After rushing for an average of 116.25 yards and three touchdowns during the first four games of the season, Liberty has turned things around the latter part of the season. The Flames have averaged 210.4 yards per game and have scored 13 rushing touchdowns during those five games. Liberty now currently ranks No. 37 nationally in rushing offense, averaging 168.56 rushing yards per game.

Back to Their Roots

Liberty has finished its last three games with 40 or more rushing attempts, carrying the ball 42 times for 168 yards against Gardner-Webb last weekend. During the first six games of the year, the Flames were averaging 33.5 rushing attempts per game.

Run, Baby, Run

The Flames ran for 259 yards against Presbyterian College on Oct. 30, the team’s second-highest rushing total of the year. Liberty has now rushed for 200 or more yards twice this season and 22 times in five seasons under head coach Danny Rocco.

Home Turf Advantage

Last year, Liberty managed to run for 24 of the team’s 31 team rushing touchdowns inside of Williams Stadium (77.4 percent). This year, Liberty has evenly spread out its scoring runs, as the Flames have finished with eight rushing touchdowns at home and eight scoring runs on the road.

Over the Century Mark

With Liberty’s six rushing touchdowns against Coastal Carolina on Oct. 17, 2009, Liberty moved over the century mark for rushing touchdowns under head coach Danny Rocco. During Rocco’s 53 games as head coach on Liberty Mountain, the Flames have rushed for 131 touchdowns (2.43 rushing touchdowns per game), including 38 games with multiple rushing touchdowns.

Colonials Halt Scoring Streak

Robert Morris snapped a 43-game streak, as Liberty failed to record a rushing touchdown during its 30-23 road setback to the Colonials on Sept. 18. Prior to the Robert Morris game, the last game Liberty did not record a rushing touchdown in was against Wake Forest on Sept. 30, 2006. Liberty has rushed for a touchdown in 50 out of 54 games under head coach Danny Rocco.

Run Blockers

For the third time in four Big South games, the Flames held an opponent to less than 100 team rushing yards, as Gardner-Webb recorded 93 yards on 31 carries. Liberty is now allowing an average of 77.8 rushing yards per game in Big South contests, as compared to 150.8 rushing yards allowed in non-conference games.

Demanding More Defense

Liberty’s highly touted offensive schemes have caught regional and national attention during the last several seasons, but it is the play of the defense that pleases head coach Danny Rocco. Last year, the Flames finished the season ranked No. 24 in the country in scoring defense (19.09 points per game), marking the third time in four years under Rocco that Liberty has finished the year holding opponents to less than 20 points per game and ranked inside the Top 25 in the statistical category.

Doing it Again

Liberty is looking like it might make another run at a Top 20 scoring defense in 2010, as the Flames are allowing an average of 16.56 points per game. The figure currently has the Flames ranked No. 10 nationally in scoring defense.

Better than the Rest

Liberty currently ranks No. 10 nationally in scoring defense, as the Flames are allowing an average of 16.56 points per game. Stony Brook ranks second in the Big South behind the Flames in the statistical category, as the Seawolves ranks No. 61 by allowing 25.00 points per game, a figure that is nearly nine points behind Liberty.

Winning in Style

Liberty has continued a growing trend under head coach Danny Rocco with some sizeable wins in 2010. The Flames opened the year with a 45-point victory over St. Francis, Pa. (52-7) and adding a 38-point victory over Savannah State (52-14), 34-points over VMI (41-7) and a 26-point victory over Gardner-Webb (40-14). These victories gave Liberty 19 wins under head coach Danny Rocco, where the Flames have won by 25 or more points, meaning 48.72 percent of Rocco's victories have been by a quarter-century margin or larger (19 out of 39).

Eight Is Great

Liberty enters today's match-up with Coastal Carolina looking to post its fourth season in a row with eight or more victories. Last year, Liberty finished the season with an 8-3 overall record. The Flames finished the 2007 season at 8-3 and 2008 with a 10-2 mark. Liberty was one of 28 FCS programs in the nation who won eight games in 2009 and the recent run marks the first time in program history Liberty has won eight games in three-consecutive seasons.

500 Frenzy

The Flames finished the Oct. 30 road game at Presbyterian College with 536 total offensive yards, marking the third time this year and the 10th time under head coach Danny Rocco the Flames have finished a game with 500 or more total offensive yards. Liberty now ranks No. 5 nationally by averaging 454.11 total offensive yards per game.

Dousing the Flames

Gardner-Webb came into last weekend's game as the second-ranked defense in the Big South. The Bulldogs did force the Flames to settle for four field goals on stalled drives and limited Liberty to 396 total offensive yards, its third lowest total of the season.

Dancing Down Marker

During their Oct. 30 road victory over Presbyterian College, the Flames finished the contest with a season-high 32 first downs. This marked the third time that Liberty has finished a Danny Rocco coached game with 30 or more first downs. Last weekend, Liberty was held to just 20 first downs by Gardner-Webb, its second lowest total of the year. Liberty now ranks No. 2 nationally in first downs, averaging 24.11 new sets of downs per game in 2010.

Different Type of First Down

The Flames finished the Presbyterian College game with 14 first downs via rushing plays, which was the program's second-highest total of the season (15 against Savannah State). The Flames have finished four out of the last five games with 10 or more rushing first downs (57 total) after recording a combined 26 rushing first downs during the first four games of the season.

Reinventing Itself

The Flames have become a predominately run-oriented program during the last eight seasons, but 2010 has seen Liberty find a new way to move the football. Through nine games this season, Liberty has racked up 115 first downs by passing plays (out of 217 first downs/53.0 percent). Only eight other FCS programs have more passing first downs than the Flames this season (Stephen F. Austin – 143, Elon – 137, Southern Utah – 135, Sacred Heart – 131, Elon – 128, Montana State – 128, Murray State – 127, Jackson State – 116).

Moving Those Chains

One of the busiest crews on the field during a Danny Rocco-coached football game is the "chain gang," as the Flames have ranked inside the Top 30 all five years in third-down conversion rate under the head coach. Last year, the Flames finished the season ranked No. 22 (42.66 percent), while the 2008 team finished the year with a 50.98 conversion rate (which ranked No. 3 in the country). Liberty is off to another great start in 2010, as the Flames currently rank No. 20 nationally in third-down efficiency (43.22/51-of-118). Under Rocco, Liberty has converted on 45.29 percent of third-down plays (308-of-680) over the last four-plus seasons.

Different Kind of Year

Liberty found much success on fourth-down plays in 2009, converting on 7-of-10 fourth-down plays, which ranked No. 5 nationally in fourth-down conversion rate (70.0 percent). All seven successful fourth-down conversions eventually led to the Flames adding points to the scoreboard. Liberty has not been as successful in 2010, as the Flames are 2-of-7 on fourth-down plays. Both successful attempts came against Charleston Southern, where the Flames scored touchdowns on the play.

Don't Even Think About It

Liberty has held six of its nine opponents to four or less third-down conversions this year. The only three teams to have third-down success this year against Liberty were Savannah State (6-of-17), Charleston Southern (6-of-13) and Presbyterian College (7-of-14). Liberty currently ranks No. 14 nationally in third-down conversion defense, allowing a new set of downs 31.15 percent of the time (38-of-122).

Fourth-Down First

Gardner-Webb accomplished something this past weekend that eight other opponents had failed to do in 2010. Bulldogs quarterback Chandler Browning completed a seven-yard pass to James Perry, III, giving Gardner-Webb a first down on a fourth-and-third play. This marked the first time that an opponent has picked up a first down against Liberty on a fourth-down play.

Stopping Them When It Counts

For the first eight games of the season, Liberty held its opponents without converting on a fourth-down play. The first opponent to do so was Gardner-Webb, who was successful on one of four fourth-down plays on Nov. 6. Liberty is currently tied for the nationally lead in fourth-down efficiency defense, as both the Flames and Bucknell have allowed one first down on nine fourth-down plays. The Flames' most notable was on a fourth-and-two play with 45 seconds left from the Liberty 26-yard line. Looking to pick up a new set of downs and extend the game, Ball State quarterback Keith Wenning attempted to get off a pass, but Flames nose guard Asa Chapman sacked him and Mike Connolly pounced on the loose ball to end the game.

Getting Better and Better

For the last three years, Liberty has bettered its own school record in completion percentage. Last year, the Flames raised the new school standard to 68.06 percent, completing 211-of-310 passing attempts. Liberty finished the 2008 season with a 64.2 completion percentage and a 62.0 percentage in 2007. Only two other programs in FCS posted better completion percentages in 2009, as Stephen F. Austin led the nation (68.33) and Lafayette finished second (68.12).

Chasing the Mark Again

Liberty enters its Big South Conference battle with Coastal Carolina having completed 65.19 percent of its pass attempts (206-of-316). Liberty currently ranks No. 5 nationally in team passing competition percentage, with Villanova leading the nation with a 67.66 completion rate (136-of-201).

Airing It Out

During the 2010 season, the Flames have certainly taken to the air to find a way to score. Liberty currently ranks No. 7 nationally in passing offense, as the Flames are averaging 285.56 passing yards per game.

Nine and Counting

The Flames have finished the first nine games of the 2010 season by passing for more than 200 yards each game. Dating back to last season, Liberty has surpassed the mark 11-straight games, which is the longest such stretch under fifth-year head coach Danny Rocco.

Two of a Kind

Presbyterian College became the second team this season to keep the Flames from recording a passing touchdown, joining James Madison, who did so earlier this year in a defensive struggle on Sept. 25. Liberty finished its game against the Blue Hose with four rushing touchdowns and two field goals to account for its 34 points.

Still Airing it Out

Liberty finished the Gardner-Webb game last weekend with two passing touchdowns, giving the Flames 22 passing touchdowns on the year. Only nine other FCS programs in the country rank ahead of the Flames, as Jacksonville leads the nation with 34 passing touchdowns, followed by Stephen F. Austin (27), Montana (26), Jackson State (24), Western Illinois (24), Chattanooga (23), Illinois State (23), Jacksonville State (23) and Montana State (23).

Still Getting it Done

Gardner-Webb came into last weekend's game the No. 6 ranked pass defense in the country, as the Bulldogs came into the contest allowing an average of 136.75 passing yards per game and six total passing touchdowns. Liberty finished the game with 228 passing yards and two passing touchdowns en route to a 40-14 victory.

Saturday Night Lights

Under head coach Danny Rocco, the Flames are 17-4 in night games. Since 1976, Liberty has compiled a 58-66-3 record in night games.

In Broad Daylight

Under head coach Danny Rocco, the Flames are 23-10 in games played during the day. Since 1976, Liberty is 125-118-1 in day games.

Natural Versus Artificial Surfaces

Under head coach Danny Rocco, the Flames are 29-11 on artificial turf and 11-3 on natural grass. Overall, Liberty is 102-108-4 on natural grass and 89-79 on artificial turf. The Flames play their home games at Williams Stadium, which has an artificial surface, as new state-of-the-art FieldTurf was installed prior to the start of the 2006 season. Liberty has posted a 24-4 record at home since the new type of surface was installed.

Overtime Update

The Flames enter today's game having posted a 3-5 record in overtime games. Liberty's last overtime game came on Sept. 15, 2007, when the Flames dropped a 48-41 decision to William & Mary in double overtime in Williamsburg, Va.

Liberty has only played two of its eight overtime games away from Williams Stadium. Liberty's first extra-period game was a 34-28 road loss to Morgan State on Sept. 21, 1996. Liberty's last victory in an overtime contest came on Nov. 22, 2003, when it closed out the 2003 campaign with a 49-42 home win over Hofstra.

Back in the Big South

Liberty is currently in the midst of its ninth season of competition in Big South Conference action, and is set to open league play against Charleston Southern at home on Oct. 9. Since beginning league play in 2002, Liberty has posted a 27-11 Big South record.

Raising Up No. 71

Prior to the start of the Flames' contest against Tusculum on Sept. 1, 2007, Liberty ceremonially honored founder Dr. Jerry Falwell, who had passed away the previous May, by starting a new game day tradition. Members of the University Police force raised a No. 71 flag underneath the Liberty Flames flag above the South end zone at Williams Stadium, just prior to the team taking the field, bringing the 14,925 fans in attendance to their feet. The new tradition has become a permanent part of the Flames' pregame ceremonies at all home football games.

None - Road Game

At This Rate

Through nine games this season, Liberty is on a pace to potentially surpass some of its team passing records. At its current pace, Liberty would finish the regular season 251-of-386 for 3,141 yards (285.6 average) and 27 touchdowns. Liberty's program records in these categories are: 262 (completions), 446 (attempts), 3,257 (yards), 296.1 (passing average) and 25 (touchdowns).

A Quick Comparison

Through nine games this season, Liberty has thrown for 22 touchdowns, which ranks No. 9 nationally in passing touchdowns. The 22 scoring throws is a new season high under head coach Danny Rocco, surpassing Liberty's total of 21 passing touchdowns in 2007.

Making it Count

Not only are the Flames racking up large passing yards this season, but Liberty is doing so at a high rate of efficiency. The Flames are one of three FCS programs in the country to have passed for more than 2,500 yards this season (2,570), with a completion percentage above 65 percent (65.2 percent). Elon (2,753 yards/66.76 percent) and Murray State (2,652 yards/67.53 percent) are the other two programs. Liberty currently ranks No. 8 in passing efficiency (150.16), while Elon ranks No. 13 (146.32) and Murray State ranks 40 (130.60).

First Down Focus

Liberty currently ranks No. 2 nationally in first down offense, by averaging 24.11 first downs per game, while ranking No. 6 in first down defense, by allowing 14.56 per game. The Flames are the lone team in the nation to currently rank inside the Top 10 in both statistical categories.

Taking Better Care of the Ball

Since taking over the program in 2006, head coach Danny Rocco has tried to instill the importance of taking care of the football. Liberty has finished inside the Top 25 all four years under Rocco in turnover margin, highlighted by the 2009 campaign, where the Flames led the country in turnover margin (+1.91). Liberty ranked No. 7 in 2007 (1.27), No. 20 in 2006 (0.55) and No. 21 in 2008 (0.67) in turnover margin.

Needing to Improve

The first nine games of the 2010 season have seem a bit of an anomaly under head coach Danny Rocco, as Liberty currently ranks No.

58 in the country in turnover margin (0.0). Liberty has committed 17 turnovers, while causing only 17. Liberty has won the turnover battle three this year, including its first two Big South games. Since 2006, Liberty has a +49 turnover figure as compared to its opponents, as Liberty has committed 64 turnovers, while forcing 113 giveaways. During the last five years, Liberty has finished 17 games (out of 53 total games) without committing a turnover.

Too Many Turnovers

The Flames are coming off one of their worst performances as far as turnovers are concerned. Gardner-Webb forced Liberty to give the ball way four times last week, with one interception and three fumbles. Liberty has lost the turnover battle the last two weeks and the four giveaways ties a program high under head coach Danny Rocco (also finished with four turnovers against Glenville State in 2008).

Setting a New Standard

During a five-game stretch late in the last year (Oct. 17 – Nov. 14), Liberty avoided throwing an interception to set a new school record for consecutive games without a picked-off pass. Under head coach Danny Rocco, Liberty's quarterbacks have thrown just 32 interceptions in 54 games (0.59 per game). Liberty has not found as much success in 2010, as the Flames have thrown 10 interceptions in nine games, with three coming against Ball State and Charleston Southern.

Picking Off Passes

Since taking over the program in 2006, head coach Danny Rocco has helped his defenders hone their skills. Liberty has picked off 62 passes in 54 games, finishing 35 of those contests with at least one interception. The Flames are a bit behind in the number this year, as Liberty has intercepted nine passes in nine games.

Interception Increase

Liberty is well behind its interception total from last year, when the Flames picked up 17 passes in 2009. The Flames have only intercepted nine passes in 2010, but seven of them have come since opening Big South play. The Flames picked off two passes against Charleston Southern, VMI and Gardner-Webb and one against Presbyterian College, helping Liberty to a 4-0 start in league play.

Rocco Draws National Attention

Head coach Danny Rocco's efforts in 2008 and 2009 did not go unnoticed on the national scene, as the three-time Big South Coach of the Year recipient saw his name listed among the nation's elite both seasons. Rocco was a Top 5 finalist in the Liberty Mutual Coach of the Year contest in the I-AA category in 2008 and 2009. Rocco also became the second coach in Big South history to be named to the Eddie Robinson Award list, as he was one of 20 coaches up for the top FCS coaching honor in the country for both seasons.

City Stadium Flashback

Due to an extensive renovation project to Williams Stadium, Liberty moved the 2010 season-opening football game against St. Francis, Pa., to Lynchburg City Stadium, where Liberty won the game, 52-7. The facility is no stranger to Liberty, as the Flames played all of their home games at City Stadium from the inception of the program in 1973 until Williams Stadium opened in 1989. During their 17-year stay at City Stadium, Liberty posted a 43-35-1 record on the historic grass gridiron.

Three Times as Nice

Liberty became the second program in Big South Conference history to win three-straight Big South titles, when it captured a share of the conference crown in 2009.

Last year, the Flames shared the crown with Stony Brook, while winning the title outright in 2007 and 2008 and posting a 14-1 conference record during the span. Coastal Carolina accomplished the same feat, winning outright conference titles in 2004 and 2006 and a shared championship in 2005 (with Charleston Southern).

Best in the Big South

For the fourth-straight season, Liberty is predicted to win the Big South Conference title. Liberty finished atop the Big South Preseason Poll, earning 103 points in the annual ranking that is selected by the league's head coaches and a media panel. The Flames garnered 13 out of 15 first-place votes, while Stony Brook finished second in the listing with 81 points.

Big Time Prize

For the first time in league history, the winner of the Big South Conference will receive an automatic bid into the NCAA FCS Playoffs. In 2010, the NCAA FCS Playoffs will expand from 16 teams to 20 selections, creating an extra round of playoff games to be contested during the opening weekend of Nov. 27.

Stony Brook is Staying

On Sept. 1, the Big South Conference announced a contract extension with Stony Brook, keeping the associate member in the league for football for another four years. Stony Brook first joined the league in 2008 and its membership will extend through the 2015 season. In just two seasons, Stony Brook has posted an 9-3 Big South record (4-2 in 2008 and 5-1 in 2009) and claimed a share of the Big South title in 2009.

Streeter Streamlines the Passers

Under quarterback coach and second-year offensive coordinator Brandon Streeter, Liberty has been one of the most effective passing units in the country. Since joining head coach Danny Rocco's staff, Streeter has seen his quarterbacks throw at a 63.9 completion percentage clip, completing 896-of-1,402 passing attempts for 11,377 yards and 78 touchdowns. During the span, Liberty has averaged 210.69 passing yards per game.

A QB's Best Friend

Liberty finished the 2009 season allowing 15 sacks in 11 games, which ranked No. 25 in the country in sacks allowed (1.36 per game). The Flames have allowed less than a sack per game under head coach Danny Rocco (0.87/47 in 54 games) during the last four-plus years and have finished 20 games without allowing a sack. This year, Liberty has allowed six sacks during the first nine games of the year, which ranks No. 5 nationally in fewest sacks allowed per game (0.67).

Not This Time Around

Against Gardner-Webb on Oct. 23, Presbyterian College finished its game with a Big South season high, posting nine sacks against the Bulldogs. Liberty's offensive line had a much better showing against the Blue Hose last weekend, as the Flames did not allow a sack to Presbyterian College, marking the third time this year Liberty has not allowed a sack in a game.

The Sack Attack

Four times this year Liberty has finished a game with more than one sack, including a season-high four sacks against Savannah State and VMI. Liberty has recorded 19 sacks during the first eight games of the year and the 2.38 per game average has the Flames ranked No. 25 in the country in the statistical category. The Flames have posted 20 games under head coach Danny Rocco with two or more sacks. Under Rocco, the Flames have averaged 1.87 sacks per game (99 total) for an average loss of 13.79 yards per game (731 total yards lost on sacks).

Dominating Performance

In its outing against VMI on Oct. 16, Liberty controlled the pace of play for nearly 60 minutes of action. VMI finished the game with 175 total offensive yards, with the Keydets posting 77 of those yards in the fourth quarter and 135 yards in the second half.

Defending the Airways

During the first nine games of the year, Liberty has held seven of its nine opponents under 200 passing yards and the Flames rank No. 29 in passing defense (allowing 170.11 yards per game). In five seasons under head coach Danny Rocco, the Flames have held 33 out of 54 opponents under 200 passing yards in a game.

Just as Nice

Tied 17-17 at halftime, Liberty's defense came up strong against Presbyterian College, on Oct. 30, as the Flames surrendered just 137 second half total offensive yards. More than half of those yards came on one play, when quarterback Ryan Singer got free for a 70-yard touchdown run. Besides Singer's fourth quarter burst, the Flames limited the Blue Hose to 67 yards on 22 plays during the final 30 minutes of action.

Keeping up the Trend

In keeping with its recent trend, Liberty limited another Big South foe as few yards as possible during the second half. En route to a 40-14 victory at home over Gardner-Webb, Liberty held the Bulldogs to 134 total offensive yards during the last 30 minutes of action.

Red Zone Rapport

Liberty finished the 2009 season ranked No. 2 in the country in red zone offense, as the Flames found a way to add points to the scoreboard on 47 of 51 drives that reached the opponent's 20-yard line. Of Liberty's 51 trips inside its opponents' 20-yard line, Liberty scored 34 touchdowns (27 rushing/7 passing) and kicked 13 field goals. Liberty has certainly kept the successful streak alive in 2010, as the Flames have scored on 34 out of 38 red zone scoring chances (22 touchdowns and 12 field goals). Liberty ranks No. 11 nationally in red zone offense, having scored on 89.4 percent of their trips inside the opponent's 20-yard line.

Making Them Count

Liberty has scored on 70 of its last 75 drives that have crossed the opponent's 20-yard line. The Flames have made the most of those scoring chances, finding a way to record a touchdown on 50 of the 70 scoring drives (71.4 percent). This season, Liberty has scored 34 of the 38 times the squad has crossed the opponent's 20-yard line, including 22 touchdowns.

Second was Twice as Nice

On Sept. 11, Mike Brown scored from one yard out, giving Liberty a 27-23 lead with five minutes left against Ball State. Four minutes later, Asa Chapman sacked Cardinals quarterback Keith Wenning on a fourth-and-two place, securing the program's second-ever win over a FBS program. Liberty's first was a 25-24 victory over Eastern Michigan on Oct. 14, 1989, in Ypsilanti, Mich.

Missed By Mere Hours

Liberty nearly became the first program in Big South Conference history to upend a FBS program, when the Flames downed Ball State, 27-23, on Sept. 11. However, the Flames fellow conference member Gardner-Webb secured the honors just hours beforehand, when the Runnin' Bulldogs scored a 38-37 overtime victory over Akron.

Fantastic Four

Liberty was one of four FCS programs to post a victory over a FBS team on Sept. 11, 2010, when the Flames completed a fantastic day for FCS football with a 27-23 victory over Ball State. Earlier in the day, No. 12 (FCS) James Madison shocked No. 13 (FBS) Virginia Tech with a 21-16 victory in Blacksburg, Va. Later in the day, Gardner-Webb beat Akron, 38-37, in overtime and South Dakota downed Minnesota, 41-38. In total, six FCS programs have defeated FBS teams through the first two weeks of the season.

Rocco Is Better Against the Best

Liberty's 27-23 victory over Ball State should not be a shock to those who have followed the progress of the team in recent years against FBS programs. Since head coach Danny Rocco took over the program five years ago, Liberty has dropped its first three games against FBS programs by a combined 34 points (Wake Forest/34-14, Toledo/35-34, West Virginia/33-20). Prior to Rocco's arrival on Liberty Mountain, Liberty lost its last FBS contest by 59 points, in a 59-0 shutout against Connecticut on Sept. 10, 2005.

Sensational "Sellouts"

Liberty fans had to wait an extra month, but it seemed worth it, as 19,314 fans packed Williams Stadium on Oct. 2, 2010, for the grand reopening of the on-campus facility (19,200). It marked the 20th time that Liberty had filled Williams Stadium beyond capacity since head coach Danny Rocco took over the program (in 28 home games under Rocco). The Flames have posted a 16-4 record during those contests, including a 52-14 win over Savannah State on Oct. 2.

The Rocco Zone

Liberty continues to be highly successful when entering the opposing team's red zone, having scored on 34-of-38 drives that penetrate the opponent's 20-yard line. Liberty currently ranks No. 11 nationally in red zone offense and has scored 22 red zone touchdowns through seven games. During the last five years under head coach Danny Rocco, Liberty has scored 85.5 percent of the times it has gotten to the opponent's 20-yard line (206-of-241), including 144 red zone touchdowns.

Tough Inside the 20

To score against the Flames inside their own red zone was a tough task in 2009, as Liberty ranked No. 9 in the country in red zone defense (66.7 percent). Opponents were only able to add points to the scoreboard on 24-of-36 drives that penetrated the Flames' 20-yard line, including nine times when Liberty's opponents had to settle for a field goal. Liberty has continued the trend in 2010, as the Flames currently rank No. 3 nationally in red zone defense. Opponents have crossed Liberty's 20-yard line 20 times in 2010 and have scored 12 times (eight touchdowns and four field goals).

Bend but Don't Break

Liberty is one of the best teams in the country in terms of red zone scoring defense, as the Flames have allowed just eight touchdowns when their opponents have crossed their 20-yard line. Delaware currently leads the country with seven red zone touchdowns allowed this season, followed by Liberty and Bethune-Cookman with eight.

Turning Negatives into Positives

For the third time this year, the Flames allowed three or fewer tackles for a loss as Liberty limited Gardner-Webb to three negative yardage stops last weekend. Liberty comes into today's game ranked No. 12 nationally in tackles for a loss allowed, as opponents are averaging 4.44 TFLs per contest against the Flames.

Clock Kings

The Flames have dominated time of possession in recent outings, finishing the last three games with a combined 37:16 time of possession advantage over VMI (12:44), Presbyterian College (15:42) and Gardner-Webb (8:50). Liberty now ranks No. 12 nationally in average time of possession (32:33) following this recent surge in time of possession.

Far Too Many Flags

For the second game in a row, Liberty struggled in the penalty category, as the Flames finished the Gardner-Webb game by committing eight penalties for 80 yards. Liberty has been flagged for 17 penalties for 171 yards during the last two games, after averaging 4.28 penalties per game and 38.57 penalty yards per game during the first seven contests of the season. Liberty now ranks No. 24 nationally in fewest penalties per game (5.22) and No. 33 in penalty yards per game (49.00) after ranking inside the Top 10 in both categories for most of the season.

Twice as Many

Liberty's stout defense has forced opposing punters to keep busy during a game, as the Flames' opponents are averaging more than twice as many punts as Liberty's punt total (29 by Liberty and 59 by opponents).

Punt Reduction

Liberty comes into today's game with Coastal Carolina having been forced to punt the ball away 29 times over nine games (average of 3.22 punts per game). The Flames currently lead the nation in fewest total punts, followed by Penn, who has been forced to punt the ball away 30 times during eight games.

Big Time Mark

Liberty finished the Presbyterian College game with a season-high time of possession advantage, ending the game with a 15:42 TOP edge. This marked the largest TOP advantage under head coach Danny Rocco. Liberty's fourth quarter control played a large part into this figure, as the Flames finished held onto the ball for 12:02 out of 15 minutes during the final quarter in Clinton, S.C.

Nearly a Record Day

Liberty finished its season-opening game against St. Francis, Pa., with 452 passing yards, as Mike Brown and Tyler Brennan combined to complete 26-of-33 pass attempts. The figure missed the school record by three yards, as Liberty's best passing performance in program history was 455 yards against Towson State on Oct. 26, 1991. The figure is the third-most passing yards in a single game this season by any FCS program.

Home Sweet Home

On Oct. 2, the Flames welcomed Savannah State to Williams Stadium, a facility Liberty has called home for the past 21 seasons. The on-campus facility was opened on Oct. 21, 1989, when the Flames rallied for a 37-18 victory over Towson State. Liberty has since won 67.2 percent of its games in the stadium, having posted a 80-39 record at the on-campus facility. In 2007, the Flames went undefeated at home for the second time in program history, posting a school-record 6-0 mark.

Top 10 Performances

A Liberty Flames football ticket was a hot commodity in 2009, leading to some of the largest crowds in all of FCS nation last year. The attendance figures at all six of Liberty's home games ranked inside the Top 10 for that specific weekend in terms of highest attended home FCS game. Liberty's Big South matchup with VMI on Nov. 7, attracted 15,208 fans, was the ninth-highest attended home FCS game in the country.

Back Against the Best

The Flames' 2008 schedule snapped a near-decade run against the nation's top level of collegiate football, as Liberty had faced a FBS opponent in nine-straight seasons. Prior to 2008, the last time Liberty did not have a FBS opponent on its slate was in 1998. During the nine-year run, Liberty faced programs such as South Florida, Marshall, UCF, Akron, Toledo, Bowling Green, Kent State, Connecticut and Wake Forest. In 2009, Liberty opened the season at West Virginia, falling 34-20 to the BIG EAST powerhouse in Morgantown, W.Va. The Flames are slated to continue their run against FBS foes in years to come, as Liberty has N.C. State (2011), Wake Forest (2012) and Kent State (2013) currently on future schedules.

Trying to be the First

Liberty enters the 2010 season trying to become the first program in Big South history to win four conference titles in a row. Coastal Carolina and Liberty have each won three-straight titles. The Chanticleers won outright titles in 2004 and 2006, while sharing the title with Charleston Southern in 2005. Liberty won outright titles in 2007 and 2008, before sharing the conference crown with Stony Brook, last season.

Grand Gates in 2009

Last year, Liberty finished the season ranked No. 1 in the country in home attendance among FCS programs, based upon filling stadium capacity. The Flames averaged 14,931 fans per home game in Williams Stadium which only seated 12,000 fans (124.43 percent). Liberty also ranked No. 8 in total home attendance (89,587) and No. 12 in average home.

Big South Record

Liberty's 452-yard passing game against St. Francis, Pa., on Sept. 4, set a new Big South Conference record. The previous team standard for passing was 431 yards by Charleston Southern against North Greenville on Oct. 25, 2003.

Tandem Ties Records

The quarterbacking tandem of Mike Brown and Tyler Brennan threw six touchdown passes against St. Francis, Pa., on Sept. 4, tying a Big South record for most touchdown passes in a game. The six touchdown passes also ties a program record, as the Flames previously threw for six touchdowns against Mars Hill on Oct. 6, 1984.

Twice as Much Fun

Just to put the 452-yard passing game in perspective, the performance against St. Francis marked only the fourth time under head coach Danny Rocco that Liberty has thrown for 300 or more yards in a game. Liberty added a fifth performance in 54 Rocco-coached games on Oct. 9, as Liberty passed for 318 yards against Charleston Southern.

Big Day for Brown

Mike Brown had a career day against St. Francis, Pa., as the junior became the 10th quarterback in program history to throw for 300 yards in a game. He completed 17-of-22 passing attempts for 338 yards and four touchdown passes. His 338 passing yards marked the 15th-best single-game performance in program history, bettering Tommy Beecher's 337-yard effort against GWU.

Better Day against the Blue Hose

Mike Brown finished the Presbyterian College game on Oct. 30 with a career-high 421 total offensive yards, rushing for a career-high 149 yards and passing for another 272 yards. This marks the second time this year Brown has finished a game with 400 or more total offensive yards, just breaking the 400-yard mark against Charleston Southern (403) on Oct. 9.

National Leader

Following a career day against Presbyterian College and another solid performance against Gardner-Webb, Mike Brown now leads the nation in total offensive yards per game. The junior is currently averaging 330.11 yards per contest, which ranks ahead of Jackson State's Casey Therriault, who is averaging 329.22 total offensive yards per game.

Getting to Be Old Hat

For the eighth time this year and the ninth time in 10 career starts at quarterback, Mike Brown finished a game with 250 or more yards of total offense. The junior racked up 297 total offensive yards against Gardner-Webb on 77 rushing yards and 220 yards through the air. Counting his start at quarterback against Lafayette last year (330 yards), Brown has amassed 3,301 total offensive yards in 10 career starts under center.

Watch List Wonder

Following a standout non-conference slate of performances, Mike Brown caught the attention of the national media. On Oct. 4, the junior was named to the Walter Payton Award watch list, which now includes 20 members. The honor is bestowed annually on the top FCS offensive player in the country. Brown is the second Liberty player to ever be named to the watch list, joining former running back and current NFL player Rashad Jennings, who finished eighth in the award's final voting in 2008.

Setting a New Standard

Mike Brown is the first Big South quarterback in league history to begin a season by passing for 200 or more yards in nine-straight games and is the first quarterback in program history to accomplish the feat in nine-consecutive outings. Brown set the new program standard with 231 passing yards against VMI on Oct. 16. The previous program record was held by Robby Justino (1990) and Brock Smith (2007-08) who reached the mark over six-straight games.

Joining Another Club

Mike Brown is drawing most of his attention for what he is doing in the pocket this year, but against Presbyterian College, the junior took to the ground to help Liberty to the road win. Brown rushed for a career-high 149 yards on 23 carries, becoming the 32nd player in program history to post a career 100-yard rushing performance.

Brown on the Ground

For the fourth-straight Big South game, Mike Brown led the Flames' rushing attack, as the junior carried the ball 15 times for 77 yards against Gardner-Webb. He is now averaging 91.8 rushing yards per game in conference play and has been Liberty's leading rusher in seven out of nine games this season.

Accurate and Efficient

Mike Brown is one of only three FCS quarterbacks in the country to currently rank inside the Top 10 in passing yards per game (No. 9/260.89) and passing efficiency (No. 9/150.15). He is joined on the elite listing by Jacksonville's Josh McGregor (289.9/172.75) and Elon's Scott Riddle (308.50/150.90).

Double Digit Dandy

Mike Brown threw for two touchdowns against Gardner-Webb last weekend, giving the junior 19 touchdown passes on the season. Brown is one of 25 FCS quarterbacks in the country to have thrown for 15 or more touchdown passes in 2010 and currently ranks No. 10 in total touchdown passes.

Fantastic Four

For the fourth time this season, Mike Brown was named Big South Offensive Player of the Week on Nov. 1. The junior shared the honor with Stony Brook's Miguel Maysonet this week after he helped the Seawolves to a 41-21 victory over Charleston Southern. Brown was also named Big South Offensive Player of the Week after notable performances against St. Francis, Pa., Ball State and Charleston Southern.

Doing It All

Mike Brown currently leads the Flames in both rushing and passing. The junior has carried the ball 119 times for 623 yards, while having completed 182-of-281 passing attempts for 2,348 yards. Brown has factored into Liberty's offensive heavily in 2010, as the junior has contributed to 62.02 percent of the team's total offensive plays (400-of-645) and 72.69 percent of the team's total offensive yards (2,971-of-4,087).

Touchdown Machine

Mike Brown was responsible for all three of Liberty's touchdowns against Gardner-Webb last weekend, as the junior recorded one rushing touchdown and threw for two others. The junior has accounted for 25 of the team's 39 touchdowns in 2010, having thrown for 19 touchdowns and rushed for six more. On the year, he ranks No. 9 nationally in points responsible for, averaging 16.67 points per game.

A Baker's Dozen

With his 277 yards against VMI on Oct. 16, Mike Brown became the 13th player in program history to surpass the 2,000 total offensive yard mark in a season. The junior has amassed 2,674 yards in eight games this year and is averaging 334.25 total offensive yards per game. Only two players have accomplished the feat in the last 11 seasons, as Biff Parson did so in 2000 (2,525) and Brock Smith in both 2007 (2,265) and 2008 (2,707).

Record in Danger

Mike Brown is currently averaging 330.1 total offensive yards per game, which has the junior ranked No. 1 nationally in the statistical category. Should the quarterback continue as this rate for the remainder of the year, he would finish the regular season with 3,631 total offensive yards. This figure would shatter Liberty's program record that Phil Basso set in 1984 (3,127 yards).

First of his Kind

With his 149 rushing yards against Presbyterian College, Mike Brown became the first player in program and Big South history to record a 1,000 career rushing, passing and receiving yards. Brown comes into today's game with 1,207 career rushing yards, 2,800 career passing yards and 1,047 career receiving yards.

A Mike Like No Other

Mike Brown comes into today's game having crossed the 1,000-career yards threshold in rushing (1,207), passing (2,800) and receiving (1,047). He is the only current FCS player in the country to have accomplished his career feat and one of only nine FCS players with 1,000 career rushing and passing yards.

Join the Group

Liberty had its first breakout rushing performance of the season against Savannah State on Oct. 2, as the Flames rushed for 288 yards and three touchdowns. Almost half of that yardage was gained by SirChauncey Holloway, who became the 31st player in program history to surpass the 100-yard mark in a single game. The sophomore finished the contest with a career-high 140 yards on 18 carries, while adding his 10th career rushing touchdown.

That's Sir to You

SirChauncey Holloway finished off three lengthy Liberty drives with one-yard scoring runs, recording three rushing touchdowns against Presbyterian College on Oct. 30. This marked the third multiple rushing touchdown game of Holloway's career and gave the sophomore 15 rushing touchdowns in 17 career games.

Running with the Elite

SirChauncey Holloway comes into the final two games of the regular season needing just two rushing touchdowns to hit double figures on the season. If he were to get the pair of scoring runs, Holloway would become the eighth player in program history to finish a season with 10 or more rushing touchdowns. The last to do so was Rashad Jennings, who surpassed the mark all three years he was at Liberty (10 in 2006, 15 in 2007 and 17 in 2008).

Big Day for Barnett

Chase Barnett had his first career breakout game against Savannah State, as the redshirt freshman finished the contest with eight rushing attempts for 56 yards. He came into the contest with 10 carries for 63 yards during the first four games of the season. Barnett also added his first career score, picking up a 24-yard rushing touchdown midway through the fourth quarter.

Keep it Coming Korrey

Korrey Davis finished second among Liberty rushers against VMI on Oct. 16, carrying the ball six times for 32 yards. His sixth carry of the day was the most noteworthy, as the Massachusetts transfer scored his first career touchdown at Liberty on a six-yard burst. During his one year with UMass, Davis did manage to score two touchdowns.

A Triple Threat

The wide receiver trio of Chris Summers (129 yards), B.J. Hayes (110 yards) and Pat Kelly (115 yards) joined an elite group, on Sept. 4, as the trio became just the second group in program history to surpass the 100-yard receiving mark in the same game. The first time Liberty had three wide receivers finish a game with 100 more receiving yards was against Toledo on Sept. 17, 1994 – Tony Dews (106 yards), Robert Butz (104 yards) and Dion Cook (100).

Leader of the Pack

Chris Summers posted his second career 100-yard game, as the junior led Liberty with seven receptions for 129 yards against St. Francis, Pa. Two of his seven catches were for touchdowns, including a “Hail Mary”-type play that saw Mike Brown heave up a 40-yard pass into the end zone on the final play of the first half. Summers became the 27th player in program history to have multiple 100-yard receiving games. His 129-yard performance was the sixth-best single game performance, on Sept. 4, among all FCS wide receivers.

Big Time Threat

Chris Summers became the 12th player in program history to have consecutive 100-yard games, as the junior hauled in 11 receptions for 146 yards and two scores against Ball State, on Sept. 11. One of his 11 catches was a 65-yard scamper for a touchdown, marking the longest reception of his collegiate career.

Five is Fantastic

For the fifth time this season, Chris Summers finished a game with 100 or more receiving yards, as the junior catch seven passes for 119 yards against Gardner-Webb last weekend. Summers currently leads the Flames with 954 receiving yards on 69 receptions and currently ranks No. 6 nationally in receptions per game (7.67), No. 6 in receiving yards per game (106.00) and No. 4 total receiving yards.

Twice as Much Fun

Chris Summers finished with two of Liberty’s three touchdowns against Gardner-Webb last weekend, giving the junior five multiple touchdown games this season. Summers has

14 touchdowns to his credit this year and No. 8 nationally by averaging 9.33 points per game.

Height Has its Advantages

Chris Summers became the first Liberty player since Daniel Thomas to record three touchdown receptions in a single game on Oct. 2. Summers, a 6-4, 190-pound junior from Jacksonville, Fla., did so against Savannah State, while Thomas, a 6-8, 215-pound freshman from Baker, Fla., accomplished the feat against Wingate in 2001. Summers matched the feat against VMI, finishing the Big South game with three touchdown receptions against the Keydets to become the first player in program history with two career three-receiving touchdown games.

New Record Holder

Chris Summers finished the VMI game with three touchdowns, helping him become the program’s single-season receiving touchdown leader. This season, Summers has hauled in 14 receiving touchdowns, surpassing the previous school record of 10 receiving touchdowns set by Eric Green in 1989.

National Leader

Chris Summers finished the Gardner-Webb game with two touchdown receptions, giving the junior 14 scoring catches on the year. Summers currently leads the country with 14 receiving touchdowns, ranking ahead of Illinois State’s Tyrone Walker, Jacksonville’s Joshua Philpart and Stephen F. Austin’s Cordell Roberson, who each have 12 receiving touchdowns to their credit.

Keeping Chris Down

Very few opponents have been able to corral wide receiver Chris Summers, as he leads the nation with 14 receiving touchdowns. However, Presbyterian College was able to do so on Oct. 30, as the Blue Hose became the second program this year to prevent Summers from finishing a game with a receiving touchdown (other was James Madison).

Six and Climbing

With his 119-yard performance against Gardner-Webb, Chris Summers now has six career 100-yard games, which is tied for third most in program history. Pat Nelson (1988-91) finished his career at Liberty with nine 100-yard games, while Courtney Freeman (1994-97) ranks second on the list with eight 100-yard career receiving games.

Conference Honors for Chris

Chris Summers has been named Big South Offensive Player of the Week two times this season. The first was following a 132-yard effort against Savannah State, where he finished with three receiving touchdowns. The second was this past weekend after Summers finished with two touchdowns and 119 receiving yards in a Big South win over Gardner-Webb. Stony Brook’s Miguel Maysonet join Liberty’s Mike Brown and Summers as the only players who have been honored as Big South Offensive Players of the Week two or more times this season.

And Chris Makes Four

Chris Summers comes into the final two games of the regular season needing 46 receiving yards to cross the 1,000-yard mark for the season. If he is able to collect the yardage, he would become the fourth wide receiver in program history with a 1,000 yards in a single season. He would join Pat Nelson (1,075 yards/1991), Dominic Bolden (1,056/2008) and Fred Banks (1,029/1984).

Chasing Another Mark

Chris Summers finished the Gardner-Webb game with two receiving touchdowns, giving him 14 on the season. His national leading total currently ranks second best in Big South Conference single-season history. Coastal Carolina's Jerome Simpson set the league record with 16 receiving touchdowns in 2006.

Joining the Group

B.J. Hayes and Pat Kelly became the 46th and 47th players in program history to record a 100-yard receiving game, doing so in the season opener against St. Francis, Pa. Hayes finished the game with seven receptions for 110 yards and a score, while Kelly caught four passes for 115 yards, including a 75-yard touchdown reception.

One More Makes Four

Ervin Garner became the fourth Liberty player this year to surpass the 100-yard receiving mark in a game this past weekend at Robert Morris. The junior finished the game with five receptions for 106 yards, including his first career touchdown on a 36-yard strike. Garner is now the 48th player in program history to have recorded a 100-yard receiving game.

Making Their First Count

Redshirt senior wide receiver Kyle DeArmon made the most of his first career reception, as the wide receiver caught a pass from Tyler Brennan and broke two tackles to score on a 27-yard pass against St. Francis. DeArmon, who was a former quarterback for Liberty, finished the game with four receptions for 78 yards, including a second score midway through the fourth quarter (a 10-yard strike from Brennan).

Career Numbers Together

Tyler Brennan's 27-yard touchdown pass to Kyle DeArmon early in the fourth quarter against St. Francis, Pa., on Sept. 4, was the first touchdown pass of Brennan's career and the first reception of DeArmon's career. In 12 career games played at Liberty, Brennan has completed 31-of-42 passing attempts for 315 yards (73.8 completion percentage) and three touchdowns.

Matthias Makes it Three

Matthias Wrede joined the first-timers group on Oct. 2 against Savannah State, as the redshirt senior followed in the first-time efforts of Tyler Brennan and Kyle DeArmon. The tight end found himself wide open over the middle of the field and caught a four-yard pass from Mike Brown for a touchdown, marking his first career reception and first career touchdown.

Bevins' New Big South Benchmark

Matt Bevins gave Liberty a 17-6 lead heading into the locker room at halftime with Charleston Southern, as the junior knocked down a 26-yard field goal. The short kick was the 41st of his career, setting a new Big South career record. The previous record was held by Josh Hoke, as the Coastal Carolina kicker finished his career with 40 field goals.

Standing Alone

Matt Bevins connected on both his field goal attempts at Presbyterian College on Oct. 30, knocking down attempts from 34 and 43 yards out. The pair of kicks pushed him past Daniel Whitehead for Liberty's all-time career record, as Whitehead finished his four-year career at Liberty with 43 career field goals (1991-94). Bevins comes into today's game with 49 career field.

Back-to-Back Honors for Bevins

This past Monday, Matt Bevins was named Big South Special Teams Player of the Week for the second week in a row. The junior took home his first weekly conference honor after a 10-point effort against Presbyterian College on Oct. 30. This past week, Bevins tied a career high with 16 points and four field goals against Gardner-Webb.

Bevins is Back

Many had concerns for Matt Bevins after the reigning All-America kicker got off to a tough start to the season, as he missed four of his first five field goal tries of the year (all four missed attempts were from 40-plus yards out). However, since knocking down his last three tries at Robert Morris, Bevins has been successful on 14-of-17 field goals and currently ranks No. 3 nationally in field goals per game (1.67) and No. 13 in scoring (8.89 points per game).

Double-Digit Dandy

Matt Bevins has finished the last three games by scoring 10 or more points, recording 11 points against VMI, 10 against Presbyterian College and 16 points against Gardner-Webb. Including an 11-point effort against Robert Morris earlier this year, Bevins has finished 10 games in his career with 10 or more points scored.

Matt's Miss Ends Streak

Matt Bevins missed a point-after attempt against Charleston So. on Oct. 9, after Liberty scored its second touchdown. The miss snapped a streak where the junior had connected on 51-straight PATs, which is the second-longest consecutive PAT streak in program history (longest was Mark DeMoss' 82-consecutive PATs). The last time that Bevins had missed a PAT was against Lafayette on Sept. 19, 2009. Entering today, the junior is 92-of-95 on point-after attempts for his career at Liberty.

Rolling, Rolling, Rolling

Matt Bevins has knocked down his last eight field goal attempts, doing so against VMI, Presbyterian College and Gardner-Webb. This marks the third time in his career Bevins has hit on eight-straight field goal attempts, as he also accomplished the feat twice in 2009.

Career Day for Matt

Matt Bevins tied to career marks on Saturday, as the junior finished the game with 16 points scored and he knocked down four field goals. Bevins also racked up 16 points last year against VMI, while he is the first player in Big South history with three career games with four field goals (also against Elon in 2008 and VMI in 2009).

Mike Makes the Most of His Time

Punter Mike Larsson earned all-conference honors in 2009, despite being the starting punter with the fewest number of total punts in the Big South. When he was called upon to boot the football down the field, he did it with precision and focus. Larsson finished the year with 40 punts for 1,469 yards (36.7 yards per punt average), with 18 punts pinning Liberty's opponent inside their 20-yard line. Liberty also finished the year ranked No. 10 nationally in punt return yardage defense. Only 13 of Larsson's 40 punts resulted in attempted punt returns for a total of 44 yards (3.38 yards per opponent return).

Pinning Them Deep in the Zone

Mike Larsson finished the Charleston Southern game on Oct. 9 with three punts for a total of 123 yards (41.0 average), with two of his three punts starting the Buccaneers at the own 20-yard line. The pair of kicks inside the 20-yard line continued a career trend for Larsson, as he has now recorded 34 out of 85 career punts where the result has pinned the opponent inside the 20-yard line (40.0 percent).

Career Day for Larsson

Mike Larsson had a career performance at VMI on Oct. 16, finishing the game against the Keydets with five punts for 232 yards. Larsson averaged 46.4 yards per punt, marking a new career high, and the total punt yards were the second most of his career.

Fantastic 40s

Mike Larsson finished the Gardner-Webb game by averaging 46.0 yards per punt, as the junior punted four times for 184 yards. Larsson has averaged 40 yards per punt in five of Liberty's last six games. Coming into the season, Larsson had averaged 40 yards per punt in three times in 19 games as a freshman and sophomore.

Playing Keep Away

B.J. Hayes is Liberty's No. 1 punt return option and one of the best in the Big South. He finished the first five games of the year with 10 punt returns and was averaging 12.0 yards per return through five games. However, opponents are keeping the ball away from him and he has finished the first four Big South games of the season with just two returns for two total yards. Hayes still ranks No. 31 nationally in punt returns, averaging 10.2 yards per return.

Big Time Burst from Broggin

Danny Broggin jumpstarted Liberty's game against Gardner-Webb last weekend, when the redshirt senior returned the opening kickoff 85 yards for a touchdown. The return was Liberty's first special team touchdown of the 2010 season and

was the first returned kick for a score since Aaron Hewlett scored on an 80-yard kickoff return against VMI on Nov. 7, 2009.

Total Team Effort

Liberty currently leads the Big South in scoring defense, as the Flames (16.88 points per game allowed) rank more than nine points ahead of No. 2 Stony Brook (25.00 points per game allowed). The Flames' staunch defense is a team effort, as the Flames only have one tackler currently ranked inside the league's Top 25 in tacklers per game (Kyle O'Donnell at No. 9/6.8 per game).

Spreading the Wealth

Liberty finished the VMI game with one of its better defensive outings, limiting the Keydets to seven points and 175 total offensive yards. Liberty's leading tacklers in the game were Doncel Bolt and Patrick Bannon with five stops each. In total, 26 different players recorded a tackle in the game, keeping up with a Liberty trend in 2010. The Flames continually rotate in fresh players on defense and have averaged 24.00 average players recording tackle stats per game (216 tacklers in nine games).

Going it Alone

Liberty finished the Presbyterian College game with 40 solo tackles, marking season high for the Flames. Over 90 percent of Liberty's total tackles were solo stops against the Blue Hose, as Liberty finished the entire game with 44 total stops. This marked the 15th time under head coach Danny Rocco the Flames have finished a game with 40 or more solo stops.

Mayo Moves Right In

Chris Mayo made the most of his first career game at Liberty, as the freshman defensive back led the Flames in tackles against St. Francis, Pa., during Liberty's season-opener on Sept. 4. The former Fork Union Military standout finished the contest with 10 tackles, including seven assisted stops and a tackle for a one-yard loss.

Chris' Conference Honors

Chris Mayo finished the Charleston Southern game with six tackles, marking his second best performance in a Liberty uniform. Following the game, Mayo was named the Big South Freshman of the Week on Oct. 11. The rookie finished the game with a career-best four solo tackles, added his second sack of the season (for a 12-yard loss) and the first two forced fumbles of his career.

Adjusting to the Adjuster

Head Coach Danny Rocco made a few alterations to his standard "3-4" defensive scheme during the offseason, adding a hybrid linebacker-cornerback position he calls an "adjuster." Danny Broggin is the athlete filling that role, and he found success during the opening game against St. Francis, Pa. Broggin finished with five tackles and an interception.

A Different Vantage Point

Danny Broggin was not only playing a newly created position on defense against St. Francis, but the redshirt senior also was seeing a different side of the field. For the first time in his Liberty career, Broggin was a defensive player, having made the switch during spring practice. During his previous years at Liberty, Broggin was used as a running back and wide receiver, having 225 total offensive yards and two touchdowns to his credit in 27 previous games.

Broggin Was Big Against Keydets

Liberty's leading tacklers against VMI on Oct. 16 finished with five stops each, but the most noticeable defensive player on the field that afternoon in Lexington, Va., was Danny Broggin. The redshirt senior set the tone early and finished the game with three tackles, including two solo sacks and an 11-yard interception.

Career Day for Claiborne

Larry Claiborne led the Flames' defensive effort against Ball State, as the junior finished the game with eight tackles and his first career fumble recovery. Claiborne also finished the James Madison game, last year, with eight tackles. Of his eight tackles against the Cardinals, five were solo tackles, setting a new career high for the defensive back.

Claiborne Keeps Coming

Larry Claiborne opened Big South Conference play in style, as the defensive back led Liberty with seven tackles against the Buccaneers, including four solo tackles. The junior now ranks fourth on the team in total tackles with 31 stops, including 18 solo tackles.

Kevin Has a Career Day

Kevin Fogg had a breakout night against Savannah State, as the sophomore finished the contest with a career-high seven tackles, including five solo stops, and was named the team's defensive player of the week. The defensive back also added 2.5 tackles for a loss after coming into the game with one tackle for a loss during his previous 15 career games.

Making the Most of His First

It took Asa Chapman 25 career games to record his first career sack, but it was worth the wait. With Ball State trying to drive late in the contest for a rally, the Cardinals' Keith Wenning took a snap from center on a fourth-and-two play from Liberty's 26-yard line with 45 seconds left. However, the Ball State quarterback was stopped, as Chapman knocked the ball out of the hurler's hand for his first career sack, sealing Liberty's second-ever victory over a FBS program.

Leader of the Pack

Kyle O'Donnell has finished as Liberty's defensive leader in five of the last seven games, doing so against Robert Morris (six tackles), James Madison (14 tackles), Savannah State (seven tackles), Presbyterian College (five stops) and Gardner-Webb (10 stops). O'Donnell currently leads the Flames with 61 tackles and ranks No. 9 in the Big South by averaging 6.6 stops per contest.

Kyle Corrals the Dukes

Kyle O'Donnell had a career day against No. 3 James Madison, as the linebacker finished the game with 14 tackles, including 10 assisted stops. The effort was the highest tackle total by a Liberty player since 2008, when Nick Hursky posted 15 stops against Gardner-Webb. O'Donnell's effort against James Madison was also the third-best single-game outing by a Big South defender this season.

Kyle Keeps It Up against the Bulldogs

For the second time this year, Kyle O'Donnell finished a contest in double figures. The linebacker led the Flames in tackles against Gardner-Webb, posting 10 stops, including a career-best six solo tackles.

Welcome to the Club

For the second weekend in a row, Liberty had a tackler join the 100-tackle club, as Patrick Bannon finished the Gardner-Webb game with four stops to crossover the career threshold. Kyle O'Donnell surpassed the career mark against Presbyterian on Oct. 30. O'Donnell now has 111 career tackles, while Bannon is right on the mark at 100. Liberty now has four tacklers with 100 more career stops, as Bannon and O'Donnell are joined by defensive captains Chad Brown (137 tackles) and Doncel Bolt (126 tackles).

Cory Is Coming On

Defensive lineman Cory Freeman has started to enjoy his expanded playing time and the redshirt freshman is putting up the numbers to back it up. Freeman came into last weekend's game against Gardner-Webb with four stops in eight games, before he recorded a season-best six stops, including five assisted tackles and a pass breakup against the Bulldogs.

On Aug. 28, during Liberty University's convocation service, Chancellor Jerry Falwell, Jr., announced plans for extensive stadium expansion at Williams Stadium and in the Vines Center, which will put Liberty's athletics facilities on par with those at the highest level of NCAA competition.

"I think these projects will take us to a higher level of competition," Falwell said. "It will put Liberty on the same level as other major universities in the state and in the region. I think it is amazing what we are accomplishing with God's help. The sky's the limit for Liberty."

Before a packed house inside the Vines Center, Falwell unveiled plans to increase Williams Stadium seating to 19,200 by the opening of the 2010 season, plus plans to add 3,000 seats inside the Vines Center.

Directly following the Flames final home against VMI on Nov. 7, Liberty began to renovate Williams Stadium, marking the first major expansion to the Flames home for football since the stadium was completed in 1989.

The first of a three-phase plan calls for the addition of 6,600 seats added to the west side of the stadium, plus a 34,000-square foot press box. The brick and glass encased, Jeffersonian-style four-story tower will house club-level seating for qualified Flames Club donors, 18 permanent luxury suites, a banquet room which can hold up to 500 people, a 1,000-seat classroom and a state-of-the-art press area.

"The expansion of Williams Stadium will have a monumental effect on Liberty University and its football program," stated Jeff Barber, Liberty's Director of Athletics. "Above all else, this shows a great commitment from the University, and when you have a commitment, a lot of wonderful things can happen."

Phase One of the plan is part of a multiphase effort to boost the stadium's seating from its current capacity of 12,000 to 30,000 over the next five years. Phases Two and Three will add a new 4,000-seat middeck for the east side of the stadium and 6,400 seats in a horseshoe-shape area surrounding the end zone in the south end of the stadium.

When all three phases are complete, the stadium will have undergone an estimated \$22 million in improvements. The renovated facility will also ready the stadium for the future construction of upper decks on the west and east sides of the stadium that will bring the capacity to 60,000.

"You cannot ignore the importance of facilities in recruiting. Kids always look for nicer facilities and to be a part of a team where they feel the program is an important overall part of the University," stated Liberty Head Football Coach Danny Rocco. "Above all, I think it just shows a great commitment from our University's administration to get our program to a level of national prominence."

Falwell said the Williams Stadium expansion is keeping up with Liberty's overall growth pattern. Fall enrollment for residential studies this year is expected to reach 11,900. Liberty had just over 5,000 on-campus students just 10 years ago.

"This stadium project is a natural step for Liberty in its progression from a small Bible college to a major university," added Falwell. "That was the goal from the beginning - to be for evangelical young people what Notre Dame is to the Catholics and what Brigham Young is to the Mormons. Athletics, and football in particular, was always a big part in that vision."

"Prospective student-athletes will see Liberty as a serious contender in NCAA Division I athletics," continued Falwell. "We'll be able to better recruit the top student-athletes in every sport. Improvements like this will help us convey the message that Liberty is achieving excellence in academics and in all of our facilities and programs. I think this will provide a major boost in both our athletics and academic recruiting. My father always said, 'If it's Christian, it ought to be better.'"

Considered the Heisman Trophy of FCS football, the Walter Payton Award was named for the legendary Jackson State and Chicago Bears running back. It was established in 1987 by The Sports Network and is presented annually to the top offensive player in FCS football.

Previous winners of the honor include NFL standouts such as the Dallas Cowboys' Tony Romo (2002, Eastern Illinois), Philadelphia Eagles running back Brian Westbrook (2001, Villanova) and quarterback Steve McNair formerly of the Baltimore Ravens (1994, Alcorn State).

Game No. 1 - No. 21/20 Liberty 52, St. Francis, Pa. 7

Sept. 4, 2010 - Lynchburg, Va. - Lynchburg City Stadium (8,286)

Liberty's season opener against St. Francis, Pa., turned out to be a throwback day in more ways than one. The Flames aired the ball out and rolled off 52-unanswered points en route to 52-7 win, Saturday afternoon, at historic Lynchburg City Stadium.

The contest was the first Liberty had played at Lynchburg City Stadium since Oct. 7, 1989, when the Flames upended No. 19 Eastern Illinois, 9-7. Liberty moved into Williams Stadium two weeks later and downed Towson State, 37-18, on Homecoming.

Reminiscent of the days of old, when some of Liberty's most prolific quarterbacks like Glenn Inverso (1977-80), Phil Basso (1981-84) and Paul Johnson (1986-89) used to roam the turf at City Stadium, Liberty used the passing game as its key to victory.

The Flames threw for 452 yards and six touchdowns against the Red Flash on Saturday. The yardage figure was the second most ever by a Liberty team in program history and the most since the Flames threw for 407 yards at South Florida on Oct. 27, 2001.

The beginning of the game belonged to the visitors, until one of several lengthy passing plays helped ignite the Flames' prolific attack. St. Francis was the first team to dent the scoreboard, jumping out to a 7-0 lead five minutes into the contest. The Red Flash won the coin toss, but gave the ball to the Flames first.

Liberty managed to get the ball to the 35 yard line, but the 23-yard drive stalled after seven plays. All-America kicker Matt Bevins was called upon to attempt a career-long field goal, 52 yards, which just missed to the right of the uprights.

The visitors kept the ball on the ground for the first four times they had possession, with the fourth resulting in a touchdown. Kyle Harbridge carried the ball three of the four plays where he picked up a total of 59 yards. The last was a 38-yard scoring burst up the middle to put St. Francis up 7-0 with 9:55 left to play in the opening quarter.

The score remained the same until the fifth play of the second quarter, when Bevins knocked down a 33-yard field goal with 12:35 left before halftime.

Liberty was able to piece together a 12-play, 55-yard drive that penetrated the Red Flash 10-yard line. However, Mike Brown was

sacked for an 11-yard loss on a third-and-two play from the seven-yard line, leaving the Flames to settle for the three-point play. A back-and-forth defensive battle was broken up with five minutes remaining in the first half. After picking up 10 yards on a quarterback scramble, Mike Brown found Pat Kelly open over the middle of the field and the sophomore wide receiver bested two defenders before finding an open field for a 75-yard touchdown reception with 5:05 left before halftime.

The scoring sprint, tied for the fourth-longest scoring play during head coach Danny Rocco's five years at Liberty, seemed to jumpstart Liberty's offense.

Trailing for the first time in the game, 10-7, St. Francis tried to take to the air to move the ball down the field. However, Danny Broggin was able to step in front of a John Kelly pass, giving Liberty the ball back at the Red Flash 39-yard line.

Brown and B.J. Hayes teamed up on the ensuing quick scoring drive to push Liberty's lead to 10 points. Following a seven-yard screen pass to the junior, Brown found Hayes open again and this time, the wide receiver was able to sprint down the field for a 49-yard touchdown reception with 2:02 left to play in the second quarter.

Liberty's defense made a quick stand, forcing the visitors to punt the ball away after a three-and-out series. With just 42 ticks left on the opening half, Brown orchestrated the Flames fourth scoring drive of the game. Following a pair of short-yardage receptions to Chris Summers and a third to Kelly that dwindled away the clock, Brown was left with his own option, a deep heave to the end zone. The 40-yard pass easily made it to the end zone with Summers finding a way to reach over top of several would-be defenders for a last-minute score to give Liberty a 24-7 halftime lead.

The Flames managed to post 195 more total offensive yards than St. Francis during the opening 30 minutes of play, as Liberty tallied 313 yards on 37 plays to the Red Flash's 118 yards on 28 plays.

More than 80 percent of Liberty's offensive yards came via the passing game, as Brown completed 14-of-19 passes for 260 yards and three touchdowns. Liberty only

managed to rush for 53 yards on 17 carries during the first half, led by SirChauncey Holloway's five rushing attempts for 24 yards.

Harbridge was the leading offensive player for St. Francis, as the running back carried the ball 15 times for 94 yards. Kelly completed 4-of-9 passes for 17 yards.

Following a three-and-out series to open the third quarter, Liberty quickly widened its advantage, moving the ball 74 yards on eight plays for their fourth-straight scoring drive.

The quarterbacking tandem of Brown and Tyler Brennan were a combined 4-for-4 on the drive for 50 yards, with the final 20 coming on a faded pass to Summers in the far corner of the end zone to give Liberty a 31-7 edge at 9:07 of the third quarter.

Summers and Brown found each other again on Liberty's next drive, with Brown lofting a 40-yard sideline pass to Brown before he was pushed out at the 12-yard line. On the next play, Holloway broke a few attempted tackles to bowl his way into the end zone for this eighth career rushing touchdown.

The scoring run pushed Liberty's lead to 31 points, 38-7, with 6:05 left in the third quarter and allowed the Flames to continue to control the pace of play the rest of the game.

Spotlighting the final 21 minutes of action were three plays of note for the Flames. The first was a blocked 33-yard field goal attempt by Brent Vinson, who nearly was able to pick up the loose football and return it for a score.

The second saw a pair of players pick up career firsts. Midway through the fourth quarter, Brennan found Kyle DeArmon open on the fair sideline and the former quarterback was able to break two tackles to score his first career touchdown on a 27-yard strike.

Following the fifth of six three-and-out drives for St. Francis on the day, Brennan and DeArmon hooked up again, this time for the game's final score on a 10-yard strike with just over four minutes to play in the contest.

The Flames rolled up 599 total offensive yards in the game, the most under a Rocco-led program.

Game No. 2 - No. 19/18 Liberty 27, Ball State 23

Sept. 11, 2010 - Muncie, Ind. - Scheumann Stadium (9,110)

Completing a day of upsets for Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) programs, Liberty became the fourth FCS program to down a FBS team. The Flames used a late touchdown by Mike Brown and numerous key defensive stands to upend Ball State, 27-23, inside Scheumann Stadium.

A defensive shift for the Flames on the opening drive to a "4-3" scheme gave Liberty a quick edge and forced the home squad to punt the ball away following a three-and-out series.

Liberty then took to the air on its first drive of the contest to take a quick 7-0 lead at the 8:59 mark of the first quarter.

Eight of the plays on the 11-play, 79-yard scoring push were of the passing variety, spotlighted by two lengthy completions. The first was a 34-yard strike from Brown to Ervin Garner on a third-and-10 play and the second was a 21-yard scoring pass to Chris Summers after Brown avoided two would-be tacklers.

Ball State tried to answer right back on the next drive and managed to penetrate the Flames' 20-yard line on a 26-yard rush by MiQuale Lewis to the Liberty nine. However, Liberty's defense once again was able to stop the Cardinals and the home squad was forced to settle for a 28-yard field goal by Ian McGarvey with 5:25 left in the opening period.

Liberty responded and widened its lead on the ensuing drive, as the Flames started to keep the ball on the ground a bit more. Four different players carried the ball on the 10-play, 69-yard drive.

The final player with a rushing attempt was SirChauncey Holloway. He used a block by offensive lineman Malcolm Boyd on the nearside of the field, allowing him to easily scamper in for a four-yard touchdown run with 11 seconds left in the opening quarter. The four-yard burst was the ninth of Holloway's career in 10 career games, giving Liberty a 14-3 advantage after 15 minutes of play.

The Cardinals appeared to trim the margin back to four points, when wide receiver Daniel Ifft scored on a 26-yard reverse play. But the scoring effort was called back after Ball State was whistled for an illegal block.

Ball State managed to get the ball to 14-yard line and elected to go for it on a fourth-and-two play, but linebacker Kyle O'Donnell was able to get behind the line of scrimmage and halt Lewis for a four-yard loss to keep the score at 14-3.

Both teams tried to tack on additional points during the final minutes of the second quarter, but both squads missed lengthy field goals that could have added three points to the scoreboard.

Liberty's miss, a 41-yard attempt by Matt Bevins, sailed just to the right of the goalpost, ending a seven-play, 27-yard Liberty drive with 57 seconds left before intermission.

Ball State's Keith Wenning was able to quickly move the Cardinals downfield, as the quarterback completed all four of his passing attempts for a total of 40 yards. Wenning's success got the ball to the 26-yard line, but McGarvey missed his 44-yard attempt to the left to leave the halftime score at 14-3.

Liberty took over possession of the ball to start the second half, but it only took three plays before Ball State got its hands on the ball.

Following two short-yardage receptions by Summers, Brown's attempt pass to Pat Kelly was picked off by Charlie Todd. Liberty's first turnover of the 2010 season was returned 36 yards by the cornerback for a touchdown, trimming Liberty's lead to four points, 14-10, 54 seconds into the third period.

Liberty managed to get to the Ball State 33-yard line on the next drive. Following two incomplete pass attempts, the visitors were forced to settle for another field goal attempt. However, Bevins' 50-yard attempt was blocked by Sean Baker and returned 10 yards.

Four plays later, Ball State took its first lead of the day, when Wenning tossed up a ball to Aaron Mershman and the freshman was able to corral in the 15-yard reception and get one foot in the end zone, giving the Cardinals a 17-14 edge with 9:54 left in the third quarter.

But the lead was short-lived for the home team, as Brown found Summers open for a career-long reception by the junior. Following two plays that resulted in a loss

of two yards, Brown found Summers over the middle of the field and the wide receiver was able to outrun the defense. The 65-yard scoring reception gave Liberty a 21-17 lead with 8:47 left in the period.

A 43-yard kickoff return and a personal foul by Liberty on the coverage gave Ball State prime field position on the next play. But a defensive stand by the Flames kept the Cardinals from finding the end zone, as Ball State had to settle for a 22-yard field goal by McGarvey to pull Ball State with one, 21-20.

On the third play of the next drive, Brown threw his second interception of the day and of his career and the junior's attempted pass was returned by Baker 31 yards to the 14-yard line.

Ball State did manage to pick up a first down on a play that got to the two-yard line, but once again Liberty's defense was able to keep the Cardinals out of the end zone. McGarvey was called upon for a 21-yard field goal on the first play of the fourth period, giving Ball State a 23-21 lead with 14:57 left in the game.

Following a third interception by Brown and a three-and-out series by Ball State, Liberty took over possession of the football with just over nine minutes of play at its own 26-yard line.

Brown completed three-straight pass attempts to get to midfield and then used his legs to move the ball the rest of the way. Three-straight rushing plays by the Big South Preseason Offensive Player of the Year set up the eventual game-winning run.

Brown called his own number again on a second-and-goal play from the one yard line and the junior bowled his way into the end zone, taking Ball State linebacker Tony Martin along with him. Following a failed two-point attempt, Liberty held a 27-23 lead with 4:47 left to play.

Ball State used the tandem of Wenning and Eric Williams to move the ball quickly downfield into Liberty territory to try and respond.

However, the Flames' battle-tested defense came up with one last defensive stand, as nose guard Asa Chapman was able to sack Wenning on a fourth-and-two play and Mike Connolly pounced on the loose ball to secure the victory with 38 seconds left in the game.

Game No. 3 - Robert Morris 30, No. 15/14 Liberty 23

Sept. 18, 2010 - Moon Township, Pa. - Joe Walton Stadium (2,893)

A 29-yard field goal by Matt Bevins left enough time on the clock for Robert Morris to drive the length of the field and score the game-winner with 22 seconds left. A 12-yard run by Myles Russ lifted the Colonials to a 30-23 victory over No. 15/14 Liberty, inside of Joe Walton Stadium.

Liberty looked like it was going to force Robert Morris to punt the ball away following a three-and-out series, as the Flames flushed Jeff Sinclair out of the pocket and nearly sacked the sophomore quarterback.

However, the hurler scrambled and found Myles Russ open over the middle of the field. The halfback made two or three moves with the last juke opening up the field for a 67-yard touchdown reception at the 12:54 mark of the first quarter.

Liberty quickly answered back, scoring on a nine-play, 60-yard drive to knot the game at 7-7 with 8:39 left in the first quarter.

On a third-and-12 play from the Colonials' 24-yard line, Liberty's offensive line gave Mike Brown enough time to find Chris Summers open in the corner of the end zone. The 24-yard strike was the fifth touchdown reception for the junior this year, who came into the weekend as the nation's No. 1-ranked wide receiver, averaging 137.5 receiving yards per game.

Following a pair of series where both teams were halted on short yardage fourth-down plays, Liberty took over possession around midfield late in the first quarter.

The Flames managed to move the football inside the Colonials' 20-yard line, but a 16-yard passing play to Pat Kelly was called back following a holding penalty.

Liberty was able to get the ball into lengthy field goal range, but Matt Bevins' 51-yard attempt missed just to the left to leave the score tied at 7-7. The failed attempt marked the third time this year Bevins has been called upon to try a 50-plus yard attempt, with all three tries narrowly missing the uprights.

The score remained the same until the final two minutes of the opening half. Robert Morris was able to piece together its longest drive of the half, an eight-play, 75-yard scoring drive to reclaim the lead, 14-7, with 1:31 left before halftime.

Sinclair dropped back on a first-and-10 play and got just enough protection to unload a 25-yard strike to Jamie Cobb before he was taken to the ground by a Liberty defender.

Cobb was able to leap over two downfield defenders and pull in the 25-yard reception, giving the Colonials a seven-point lead with 91 seconds left in the first half.

The remaining time was enough for Liberty to add points to the scoreboard when Bevins knocked down a 37-yard field goal with six seconds left before intermission.

Brown was able to quickly move the Flames downfield and nearly connected with Summers for his second touchdown reception of the game. On a third-and-eight play from the 16-yard line, Brown dropped back and tried to thread the needle for a scoring strike to Summers, but Ryan Nearhoof batted the ball down at the goal line, forcing Liberty to settle for three points on the drive and a four-point deficit at the break.

LU took to the ground to open the second half, getting back-to-back lengthy rushing plays by running backs Korrey Davis (13 yards) and SirChauncey Holloway (17 yards) to set up Bevins' second field goal of the day. His 23-yard field goal at the 12:26 mark of the third quarter trimmed Robert Morris' lead to 14-13, and finished off a nine-play, 54-yard second half opening scoring drive. After Robert Morris' next series, Nick Schirtzinger's 51-yard punt pinned Liberty at its own two-yard line. After two failed attempts to move the football, Mike Brown dropped back into the end zone for a sideline pass to the near side of the field on a third-and-10 play.

However, Liberty was called for holding on the play, resulting in the first safety Liberty has allowed since the Presbyterian game, last season, and gave Robert Morris a 16-13 edge with 6:07 left in the third quarter.

Following the free kick, the Colonials looked like they might extend their lead again, as a 37-yard pass play to T.J. Green drove Robert Morris deep into Liberty territory. But, Liberty's defense came up with a stand and forced the home squad to punt the ball away.

The defensive stand seemed to spur Liberty's offense, as the Flames put together

their best drive of the day to take their first lead of the afternoon.

Brown dropped back to pass on back-to-back plays, but was forced to tuck the ball and run to pick up short-yardage gains and set up a third-and-five play at the Colonials' 36-yard line.

On the next play, Brown got enough time to throw the ball down field and he found Ervin Garner open in single coverage. The sophomore was able to pull in the reception and beat his defender, scoring his first career touchdown on a 36-yard reception to give Liberty a 20-16 lead with 13:01 left in the final quarter. The advantage was short lived, as the Colonials quickly marched downfield and regained the lead.

A 34-yard pass from Sinclair to Anthony Coleman got Robert Morris near the red zone and a personal foul penalty gave the Colonials the ball at the four-yard line. Following a failed pass play to Shadrae King on a slant route, Russ took a handoff and found room on the outside to score and give Robert Morris a three-point lead, 23-20, with 10:20 left in the game.

The two teams traded unsuccessful drives during the next five minutes, leaving the Flames down three with just over five minutes left in the game.

Two double-digit yard pass plays from Brown to Summers got the Flames inside the Robert Morris red zone, but the pair could not complete a third, forcing Liberty to settle for Bevins' game-tying 29-yarder with 1:19 left on the game clock.

Sinclair took to the air in an attempt to move his team into field goal range. He completed four-straight pass attempts for a combined 68 yards, including a 32-yard strike to Green to get to the LU's 12-yard line.

Trying to position the ball near the center of the field, Robert Morris elected to hand the ball to Russ one last time and the senior found a hole on the right side, scoring the eventual game winner from 12 yards out with 22 seconds left.

Liberty managed to pick up one first down on the ensuing drive, but Brown's "Hail Mary" pass downfield on the game's final play was picked off by Michael Landers in the end zone to give Robert Morris its first-ever win over a ranked FCS opponent.

Game No. 4 - No. 3/3 James Madison 10, No. 22/21 Liberty 3

Sept. 25, 2010 - Harrisonburg, Va. - Bridgeforth Stadium (16,385)

No. 3/3 James Madison used a third-quarter field goal to give the Dukes a cushion and then outlasted the No. 22/21 Liberty in a defensive struggle, claiming a 10-3 victory inside of Bridgeforth Stadium.

The victory keeps James Madison unbeaten on the season and ups the Dukes' record to 3-0. The loss, Liberty's second in row, drops the Flames' record to 2-2 and closes out a three-game road swing.

The game remained scoreless until the fourth play of the second quarter, but it was a play late in the first quarter that allowed Liberty to take the early 3-0 edge.

Liberty's second drive of the game stalled at its own 32-yard line, following a deep pass downfield from Mike Brown to Chris Summers along the sideline. However, punter Mike Larsson was interfered with on the attempted punt, giving Liberty 15 extra yards and a new set of downs.

Brown completed his next four pass attempts to drive Liberty down to the goal line, but his floating pass to tight end Tommy Shaver in the endzone was just out of the reach of the tight end, forcing Liberty to settle for three points. Matt Bevin's 19-yard field goal at the 13:28 mark of the second completed an 18-play, 95-yard drive that ate up 9:40 on the game clock and staked Liberty to the early lead.

The score remained the same until the waning minutes of the first half. For the second time in the half, Liberty crossed midfield, getting to the Dukes' 31-yard line, which prompted head coach Danny Rocco to elect to go for it on fourth and a short one. But for the third time this year, Liberty was shut down on a fourth-down play, as Brown was not able to get the nose of the football beyond the yardage marker.

Two plays later, James Madison quarterback Drew Dudzik showed his athleticism, as the redshirt senior got outside the pocket and scampered 39 yards downfield to Liberty 25-yard line. On the next play, the quarterback dropped back and found a wide-open Griff Yancey for a score, giving James Madison the 7-3 edge with 53 seconds left in the period.

Following the quick scoring drive at the end of the half, James Madison headed into the locker room at the intermission with a

164-149 total offensive yardage edge. Liberty picked up most of its yardage via the passing game (102 yards), while James Madison rushed for the same amount of yards (102) on 16 carries.

Following a three-and-out series to open the second half for James Madison, Liberty managed to once again drive to James Madison's 30-yard line. However, a 47-yard field goal attempt by Bevin was blocked at the line of scrimmage, keeping the score the same on Bevin's fifth 40-plus yard attempt of the year.

The blocked field goal by the Dukes eventually led to three additional points for the home squad. James Madison elected to keep the ball on the ground for eight of the next drive's nine plays.

On a third-and-two play from Liberty's four-yard line, Danny Broggin and Terry Adams were able to get behind the line of scrimmage and stop Scott Nobles for a one-yard loss, leaving James Madison to settle for a 22-yard field goal by Dixon Wright with 6:23 left in the third quarter.

The remainder of the game belonged to the defensive players, as the two squad's offensive players managed to pick up just seven additional first downs during the last 21 minutes of the contest.

Liberty managed to cross the 50-yard line on two of its last four drives of the evening. The last time the Flames touched the football, Liberty found itself needing to piece together a 79-yard touchdown drive with just over three and half minutes left to play. Brown found Shaver open on a 16-yard strike over the middle of the field on the first play, but three plays later, the quarterback was flushed from the pocket, forcing a deep pass downfield. But the pass was picked off, as Taveion Coffee was able to step in front of the effort and pull it in just before he fell out of bounds.

James Madison kept the ball on the ground for the next three plays, including a game-sealing three-yard effort by Nobles, who got to the outside and was able to stretch the football out just enough to get first down and allow the home squad to run the rest of the game clock out.

The second 30 minutes of the game was even more of a defensive effort, as James

Madison finished the last two quarters with 119 total offensive yards to Liberty's 115.

Liberty's game-ending 264 total offensive yards marks the eighth time Liberty has failed to cross the 300-yard threshold in the five years under Rocco. It is also the second-straight game Liberty has failed to finish a game against James Madison with more than 300 total offensive yards after finished last year's rain-soaked contest with 217 total offensive yards.

The game also marked the second time that Liberty has finished a game in the last five years without a touchdown. The last was a 10-3 loss at Towson on Sept. 16, 2006.

Brown finished as Liberty's No. 1 rusher for the third week in a row. The quarterback rushed for 26 yards on 11 carries. Korrey Davis led the team in rushing attempts, finishing the game with 13 carries for 25 of Liberty's 61 team rushing yards. Nobles was James Madison's No. 1 rusher with 17 carries for 89 yards.

Brown finished the game by completing 21-of-32 for 203 yards, while his counterpart, Dudzik, was 6-of-14 for 78 yards and the eventual game-winning touchdown late in the second quarter.

Summers was Liberty's top receiver, finishing the game with eight catches for 66 yards, while Yancey caught two passes for 56 yards and the game's lone touchdown.

Kyle O'Donnell had a career night and led all tacklers with 14 stops, including 10 assisted tackles, 1.5 tackles for loss and a forced fumble. Doncel Bolt followed with nine stops, including six solo tackles, followed by Chad Brown's eight-tackle effort.

Following three road games in a row, Liberty will return to Williams Stadium next weekend for the grand re-opening of its on-campus facility. During the last nine months, the stadium has undergone an extensive renovation, expanding the stadium seating capacity from 12,000 to 19,200 and adding a five-story press and suite tower.

Game No. 5 - No. 25 Liberty 52, Savannah State 14

Oct. 2, 2010 - Lynchburg, Va. - Williams Stadium (19,314)

It took an extra month to complete, but the record-setting crowd that saw Liberty roll to a 52-14 victory over visiting Savannah State inside of a renovated Williams Stadium Saturday evening saw quite a show, both on and off the field.

During the last nine months, Williams Stadium, Liberty's on-campus football facility since 1989, underwent a major renovation. The stadium received additional seating, expanding the seating to 19,200, while adding a five-story press box with 18 luxury suites and an 11,000-square foot Flames Club Pavilion room.

A burst of excitement helped the Flames quickly jump out to a lead, almost from the first time Liberty touched the football. The Flames won the opening coin toss and elected to receive.

Danny Broggin took the opening kickoff the length of the field, returning Derek Williams' kick for what the record-setting crowd thought was an 88-yard return for a score. But half the yardage on the play was negated following a personal foul.

However, it didn't take long for Liberty to score. Following two 10-plus yard pass plays from Mike Brown to Pat Kelly and Chris Summers, Brown called his own number and scored from 18 yards out to provide Liberty's first score of the evening.

Liberty forced Savannah State to punt the ball away and B.J. Hayes gave Liberty great field position, following a 45-yard punt return.

Four plays later, Brown lofted a ball into the near corner of the end zone and junior Summers hauled in his first score of the night on a nine-yard pass play to give the Flames a 14-0 edge.

Liberty forced a three-and-out series on the next drive, but Mike Larsson's punt was blocked by Rashaud Ferrell, who then returned the loose ball 22 yards for a score. The 22-yard return was the first opponent blocked punt returned for a score since Lafayette did so on Oct. 18, 2008.

But momentum did not remain on the Tigers' side for long, as a pair of 30-yard plays pushed Liberty's lead to 21-7 with 4:27 left in the first quarter.

Two plays after SirChauncey Holloway took a handoff 32 yards, his longest run of

the season, Brown hooked up with Summers again. The quick three-play, 62-yard drive was finished off when Summers leaped up to pull in a 30-yard touchdown reception.

The score remained the same until midway through the second quarter, when Liberty kept the ball on the ground seven times during a nine-play, 73-yard drive.

However, the last play saw Liberty take to the air again, as Brown found a wide-open Matthias Wrede for his first career reception. The four-yard scoring strike at 9:59 pushed Liberty's lead to 28-7.

Liberty almost added its fourth passing touchdown of the first half eight minutes later, when Brown found Ervin Garner deep downfield. But the 45-yard pass was just a bit underthrown and the junior had to come back for the reception and was tackled at the two-yard line.

Two plays later, SirChauncey Holloway found a hole open on the right side of the line, scoring from two yards out to give Liberty a 35-7 margin with 1:54 left to play in the period.

Both teams tried to tack on additional points during the final two minutes of the half, but both squads missed field goals. Williams' 44-yard attempt fell well short of the goal posts, while Matt Bevins' 38 yarder as time expired missed wide to the right.

Liberty nearly tripled Savannah State's total offensive production during the opening 30 minutes of play. The Flames finished with 350 yards of total offense on 35 plays, while Savannah State posted 123 yards on 30 plays.

Brown was Liberty's top offensive weapon, as the junior completed 12-of-16 pass attempts for 216 yards and three touchdowns. Six of his 12 completions were to Summers, who tallied 106 yards and two scores during the opening 30 minutes.

On the ground, Holloway rushed for 77 yards and a score on 10 carries, followed by Brown's six carries for 54 yards and the team's other rushing touchdown.

Big plays continued to be the theme of the second half, as all three touchdowns scored came during plays that resulted in 10 or more yards.

The first three of Liberty's 17 second-half points came on a 27-yard field goal by Bevins

with 7:31 left in the third quarter, completing an eight-play, 78-yard scoring drive.

The Tigers quickly answered back on three big plays. The first of the trio was a 15-yard pass by Antonio Bostick to Alakan Thomas, followed by a 22-yard run by Sheldon Barnes, thanks to a hole opened on the right side of the line.

The next play, Bostick, who entered the game as Savannah State's back-up quarterback, completed a 32-yard flea-flicker play to an open Brian Lackey in the end zone to trim Liberty's lead back to 38-14 with 6:16 left to play.

But that would be as close as the Tigers would get, as Liberty would tack on two fourth-quarter touchdowns to complete the evening.

Tyler Brennan completed a nine-play, 76-yard scoring drive on Liberty's first possession of the fourth quarter by finding Summers open for his third touchdown pass of the night. The 17-yard strike came with 8:51 left in the football game.

After a three-and-out series forced the Tigers to punt the ball away, back-to-back bursts by Chase Barnett allowed Liberty to post its ninth 50-point game under head coach Danny Rocco. The second run was a 24-yard scamper for Barnett, his first collegiate rushing touchdown, giving Liberty its final score of the night.

Liberty finished the game with 564 total offensive yards, the team's second-highest offensive output of the year.

Brown only completed two additional passes during the second half, finishing the contest with 231 passing yards on 14-of-19 completions and three touchdowns.

Holloway became the 31st player in program history to post a 100-yard rushing contest, as the sophomore finished the game with a career-high 140 yards on 16 carries. Barnett finished behind him with 56 yards on eight rushing attempts and a score.

Summers posted his third 100-yard game of the season, finishing with 132 yards on eight receptions. The junior also posted three touchdown receptions, giving him eight on the season, which leads all FCS receivers in the country.

Game No. 6 - No. 24 Liberty 44, Charleston Southern 20

Oct. 9, 2010 - Lynchburg, Va. - Williams Stadium (18,587)

Reigning Big South Offensive Player of the Year Mike Brown made a push to retain the title, as the junior was responsible for five of Liberty's six touchdowns. The play of the quarterback helped No. 24 Liberty open up conference play with a 44-20 victory over Charleston Southern in front of a Homecoming crowd of 18,587 fans.

Neither team could get much going early, as Liberty nor Charleston Southern posted points during a scoreless first quarter, combining for 147 yards of total offense. However, on the last play of the opening 15 minutes, Liberty struck on for a 35-yard screen play from Brown to SirChauncey Holloway, where the running back was brought down at the five-yard line.

Four plays later, Brown rolled out on a fourth-and-goal from the one and found Holloway open in the end zone, giving Liberty a 7-0 lead at the 13:34 mark of the second quarter. The one-yard pass to near corner of the end zone was the first receiving touchdown of the sophomore's career.

The score remained the same until the midway point of the second quarter, when the Flames pieced together their longest drive of the first half. Brown completed 3-of-4 passing attempts, picking up all but three yards via the passing game on the 77-yard drive.

The last play was a 40-yard sideline pass, with Brown finding wide out Pat Kelly open on the far side of the field for his second touchdown reception of the season. The 40-yard scoring play gave Liberty a 13-0 advantage at 7:01, as Matt Bevins missed the point-after attempt.

Both teams were able to tack on additional points during the waning minutes of the opening period, starting with Charleston at the 1:40 mark.

Back-up quarterback Andrew Trudnowski, who took over for an injured A.J. Tuscano, led Charleston Southern to its first scoring drive in six tries. The senior was a perfect 4-of-4 on the 10-play, 80-yard scoring drive, with all four of his receptions going for 10 or more yards.

The last was a 13-yard pass to Anthony Chalmers in the right corner of the end zone, trimming Liberty's lead to 13-7 just under the two minute mark.

However, the Buccaneers did leave enough time on the game clock for the Flames to score before the halftime horn sounded.

A quick nine-play, 66-yard drive, that used only 1:16 on the game clock, was aided by a 43-yard reception by Gabe Henderson to the Charleston Southern 21-yard line.

A pair of quarterback keepers by Brown allowed Liberty to get to the eight-yard line, but Charleston Southern was able to defend Chris Summers on the third down play.

The junior, who came into the game as the national leader with eight touchdown receptions, was well defended in the end zone, forcing the Flames to settle for a 26-yard Bevins field goal.

Brown continued to be Liberty's No. 1 option during the opening 30 minutes of play, as the junior finished the first half with 221 of the team's 238 total offensive yards. The quarterback carried the ball eight times for 18 yards, while completing 12-of-20 pass attempts for 203 yards and two scoring passes.

Holloway was Brown's first option during the opening half, catching three passes for 46 yards, followed by Kelly's two catches for 56 yards.

Toscano (7-of-11) and Trudnowski (4-of-4) finished with 107 of their team's first half total offensive yards, as the pair of quarterbacks threw for 46 and 61 yards, respectively. DeMarcus Moon was Charleston Southern's top rusher, carrying the ball five times for 37 yards.

The Buccaneers came out of the locker room and methodically put together the day's longest scoring drive to pull within two points, 16-14, following a 15-play, 80-yard drive that chewed up 7:58 on the game clock.

Trudnowski continued to remain efficient, as the senior completed 6-of-7 passing attempts on the drive for a total of 65 yards. The final pass was a 22-yard scoring strike to B.J. Hackworth with 7:02 left to play in the third quarter.

Two plays later, Brown was intercepted for the second time on the day by Charles James, giving Charleston Southern the ball at Liberty's 34-yard line.

The Buccaneers got the Flames' two-yard line, before Kyle O'Donnell forced Trudnowski to fumble the ball at the line of scrimmage and recovered the ball for the turnover. The fumble was Trudnowski's second turnover of the game, giving the Flames the ball back.

Both teams turned the ball over on each of their next drives, as Brown was intercepted by James for the third time, followed by a Chris Mayo sack of Trudnowski, forcing a fumble that was recovered by Demetrius Ward.

Liberty made good on the second-straight Charleston Southern giveaway, when Brown called his own number for a seven-yard scamper to push Liberty's edge to 24-13 at the 12:06 mark of the fourth quarter.

The eighth and final turnover of the game led to Liberty's next score, as Brent Vinson intercepted Trudnowski and returned the errant pass 15 yards. Holloway carried the ball the next three plays, scoring on the third from 13 yards out to push Liberty's lead to 30-14 with 6:48 left in the game.

The final six-plus minutes saw the team combined for 21 points, starting with a 19-yard touchdown run by Brown with 2:29 left in the contest.

The Buccaneers answered right back, as Gerald Stevenson returned the ensuing kick-off 100 yards for a score, trimming Liberty's advantage back to 17 points, 37-20.

With the return, Stevenson became the second player in Big South history to return a kick the length of the field for a score, as Gardner-Webb's David Montgomery did so against the Flames last year on Nov. 14, 2009.

Liberty tacked on the game's final tally, when Brown found Summers open in the end zone for the junior's national leading ninth touchdown of the year. The 29-yard strike gave Liberty, its final 24-point cushion, 44-20, with 28 ticks left on the clock.

Charleston Southern, who came into the game as the lone team in the league with a positive turnover margin (+1), finished the game with a season-high five giveaways. Liberty converted two of those five turnovers into touchdowns.

Oct. 16, 2010 - Lexington, Va. - Foster Stadium (7,157)

A dominating first-half performance, spotlighted by a record-setting day by Chris Summers, allowed the No. 19/21 Flames to capture a 41-7 Big South victory over VMI inside of Foster Stadium.

It took a few drives for the two teams to feel each other out, as the game remained scoreless until the midway point of the first.

Following the first three-and-out series of the day by VMI, Liberty took over at its own 16-yard line. After Tyler Brennan completed short-yardage passes to Mike Brown and Pat Kelly, Brown returned under center found Summers open deep downfield.

On the seventh play of the 84-yard scoring drive, Brown faked a handoff to SirChauncey Holloway, causing the Keydets' defense to come to the line of scrimmage. However, Brown pulled the ball back and found Summers open down the sideline for a 54-yard touchdown reception at the 7:44 mark of the first quarter.

Following a second-straight three-and-out series by the home squad, Liberty took to the air to set up its next touchdown, doubling up its lead to 14-0.

Brown completed three 10-plus yard passes on the five-play, 52-yard drive to Tommy Shaver (15 yards), B.J. Hayes (16 yards) and Peter Gagliardi (11 yards). The trio of passing plays set up a three-yard burst up the middle by Holloway to give the Flames a two touchdown lead at the 3:30 mark.

VMI's offense, that finished the first quarter with negative two yards of total offense on nine plays, continued to struggle and was forced to punt the ball away after a fourth three-and-out series in a row.

The Marc Ray punt only sailed 19 yards, giving the Flames their best field possession of the first half at the VMI 40-yard line.

Four plays later, Brown and Summers hooked up for a record-setting pass play, as Brown found Summers open over the middle for a 23-yard touchdown pass to push Liberty's lead to 21-0 at 10:57 in the second quarter.

The scoring play gave Summers his 11th touchdown reception of the year, breaking Liberty's previous single-season school record of 10 touchdown catches by Eric Green in 1989.

The Keydets managed to pick up their first new set of downs on the afternoon on a 16-yard pass play from Adam Morgan to T.J. Talley, but VMI was forced to kick the ball away four plays later.

During the last nine minutes of the half, Liberty was able to extend its margin by 10 additional points, thanks to a third Summers touchdown and a 25-yard field goal by Matt Bevins.

The drive where Liberty picked up three points by virtue of Bevins' 42nd career field goal, was aided by a special teams mishap from the Keydets.

Liberty was forced to punt the ball away a three-and-out series, but Mike Larsson's 43-yard punt was mishandled by Mike Smith and Kevin Fogg recovered the turnover at the VMI 18-yard line.

On Liberty's next possession, Brown completed his last three pass attempts on the eight-play, 56-yard scoring drive, when he threaded the needle for a 17-yard strike to Summers with 1:14 left before the intermission.

The Flames controlled all aspects of the game during the opening 30 minutes of play, outgaining VMI, 322 to 40 yards. Liberty managed to record 18 first downs to VMI's two, while the Flames held a 19:25-10:35 time of possession edge.

Brown and Summers continued to add to their stellar seasons. Brown finished the first half 14-of-21 with 204 passing yards and three touchdowns, while leading the team with 36 rushing yards on six carries. Summers caught five passes for 115 yards and three scores.

Morgan was limited during the first half, as the quarterback was 4-of-11 for 32 yards, but lost 23 yards on three different sacks. Chaz Jones carried the ball six times for 21 yards.

VMI tried to make a push to get back into the game early in the third quarter. However, the Keydets were forced to punt on the first drive and Cameron Jones was intercepted by Danny Broggin on their next drive, ending any threat the home squad had of making a comeback.

Liberty did manage to add 10 additional points during the last 30 minutes, while VMI ended the threat of the seventh

shutout under head coach Danny Rocco with a fourth quarter rushing touchdown by Chaz Jones at 10:15.

The Flames used the Broggin interception to jumpstart one scoring drive. Seven plays after the turnover, Korrey Davis recorded his first rushing touchdown at Liberty, when redshirt sophomore burst up the middle to score from six yards out at 4:45 of the third quarter.

Bevins gave Liberty its last score, when the kicker capped the first drive of the fourth quarter with a 42-yard field goal at 12:30. The lengthy kick gave Bevins his 43rd career field goal, which tied him with Daniel Whitehead (1991-94) for the program's career record.

Liberty, who came into the game ranked No. 7 nationally in total offense, finished the game with 447 total offensive yards. It marked the third-straight game the Flames have passed the 400-yard mark the fifth time in seven games this season.

The Flames posted their second-best team rushing total of the season, running for 174 yards on 40 carries and two rushing touchdowns. The Flames hit the 200-yard passing mark for the seventh-straight game by passing for 273 yards and three scores.

Brown was once again Liberty's No. 1 option during the game, as the junior quarterback finished with 277 total offensive yards. He completed 17-of-28 passing attempts for 231 yards and three touchdown passes, while leading the team with seven rushed for another 46 yards.

Davis finished second on the squad, rushing for 32 yards on six carries, while Irwin Coleman carried the ball nine times for 28 yards.

Summers posted his fourth 100-yard game of the year, as the junior caught six passes for 120 yards and three scores. Following his second three-touchdown game of the year, the junior currently leads the nation with 12 touchdown receptions.

Liberty's dominating defensive effort, which just yielded 213 total offensive yards to VMI, was a team effort, with the Flames' leading tackler finishing with five stops.

Broggin finished with Liberty's other two sacks, totaling a loss of 15 yards, while adding three solo tackles.

Game No. 8 - No. 16/12 Liberty 34, Presbyterian College 24

Oct. 30, 2010 - Clinton, S.C. - Bailey Stadium (3,140)

No. 16/12 Liberty overcame two first half turnovers and a tied halftime score by scoring on its first three drives of the second half, propelling it to a 34-24 victory over Presbyterian College.

Liberty wasted little time jumping out to a quick 7-0 lead. The Flames took the opening kickoff and marched down the field for a touchdown at 11:49. It was the seventh time in eight games that the Blue Hose have allowed a touchdown on their first defensive series of the game.

The ninth and final play of the 64-yard scoring drive was a handoff to SirChauncey Holloway. The sophomore easily found a hole on the left side of the line to score his team-leading sixth rushing touchdown of the season from one-yard out.

After trading unsuccessful drives, Presbyterian College got on the scoreboard, when Cam Miller connected on a 39-yard field goal with 1:05 left in the first quarter. The 13-play, 69-yard scoring drive was spotlighted by lengthy runs of 20 and 25 yards by Trandon Dendy, the Blue Hose's leading rusher coming into the contest.

Presbyterian College took its first lead of the afternoon three drives later, thanks to a Liberty turnover. Facing second-and-six from the 41-yard line, Mike Brown scrambled and tried to find Chris Summers open downfield. But the junior overthrew the receiver and it was picked off by Matthian Burton.

The errant pass was returned 41 yards to the Liberty 24-yard line, setting up the Blue Hose's next score. Four plays later, backup quarterback Ryan Singer called his own number and scored from five yards out to give the home team a 10-7 edge with 10:13 left to play in the first half.

The Flames answered back on the ensuing drive, but were forced to settle for a 34-yard Matt Bevins field goal at the 5:58 mark of the second quarter, tying the game at 10-10. The kick was the 44th successful field goal of his career, making him the school's new all-time field goals leader.

A 16-yard burst to the right side of the field gave the Flames a new set of downs inside the 20-yard line. However, the nation's No. 3 red zone scoring offense could not find the end zone. Brown attempted to thread the needle on a pass to the end zone for Kyle

DeArmon, but Greg Palmer was able to get a hand in front of the pass for the break-up.

Liberty's defense came up strong on the next drive, forcing a three-and-out for PC. However, another Liberty turnover gave the home squad a chance to put additional points on the scoreboard.

Brown kept the ball on a 1-and-10 play at its own 34-yard line, but Brian Wilson was able to dislodge the football and Derek Brown came up with the loose ball for the Blue Hose.

Four plays later, Myron Gary found Dendy open in the flat and the redshirt senior was able to find the end zone on the 12-yard scoring play to take a 17-10 edge with 1:09 left in the quarter.

The back and forth scoring continued, as Brown was able to overcome his second turnover of the game and lead the Flames 67 yards down the field to quickly knot the game in 46 seconds.

A 28-yard pass to Summers and a 19-yard reception by B.J. Hayes set up consecutive runs by Brown to find the end zone. After a 13-yard scamper, the junior scored his 16th career rushing touchdown by calling his number to score from seven yards out and knot the score with 23 ticks left on the first-half clock.

The Flames finished the first half with 110 more offensive yards than the home team, as Liberty finished with 237 yards on 44 plays to PC's 127 yards on 30 plays.

Holloway and Brown both scored on the ground and finished with 50 and 46 rushing yards, respectively. Brown was 14-of-24 for 124 yards, while Summers was the leading receiver with six catches for 50 yards.

After forcing the Blue Hose to punt the ball away on the opening drive of the third quarter, Liberty took the ball the length of the field to regain the lead, 24-17, with 6:26 to play in the quarter.

Patrick Morgano's punt pinned Liberty at the one-yard line, but Brown led the charge for the Flames to regain the lead. Brown carried the ball five times for 48 yards and completed two passes for 28 yards on the drive, setting up a one-yard burst by Holloway up the middle for the score. The burst

completed a nine-play, 99-yard scoring drive, the longest of the season by the Liberty offense.

A sack by Danny Broggin and a pass break-up by Kevin Fogg on the next drive forced the Blue Hose to punt after three plays on the next drive, which set up Liberty's next score.

Brown was 4-of-4 on the 66-yard scoring drive, including a 32-yard pass over the middle to Gabe Henderson, setting up Holloway's third one-yard rushing touchdown of the afternoon. The scamper up the middle pushed Liberty's lead to 31-17 with 80 seconds left in the third quarter.

Liberty scored on its third-straight drive of the second half when Bevins connected on his second field goal of the game. The 43-yard effort, his longest of the season, gave Liberty a 34-17 lead with 8:11 left in the contest.

Presbyterian College tried to stay in the game, as Singer scored on the next play with a 70-yard rushing touchdown to pull the Blue Hose back within 10 points, 34-24.

The Blue Hose were able to stop the Flames on their next drive, when Brown's pass fell incomplete on a fourth-and-second play at the PC six-yard line. However, Liberty used up more than five minutes on the clock during the drive, which did not leave enough time for the home squad to mount one last charge.

For the third time this year, Liberty finished a contest with 500-plus offensive yards. The Flames, who came into the game ranked No. 7 nationally in total offense, finished the game with 536 yards on 85 plays, averaging 6.3 yards per offensive play.

Brown accounted for nearly 80 percent of Liberty's offensive yards. The junior, who individually ranked No. 2 nationally in total offense, finished the contest with a career-high 421 total offensive yards. He rushed for 149 yards, marking his first career 100-yard game on the ground, and completed 25-of-38 pass attempts for 272 yards.

Brown finished the game with 23 carries, followed by Holloway, who rushed for 71 yards on 13 carries and a career-high three touchdowns.

Game No. 9 - No. 14/12 Liberty 40, Gardner-Webb 14

Nov. 6, 2010 - Lynchburg, Va. - Williams Stadium (16,441)

A game-opening kickoff return for a touchdown set the tone early for the Flames, propelling No. 14/12 Liberty to a 40-14 Big South win over Gardner-Webb in front of 16,441 fans at Williams Stadium on Military Appreciation Day.

The Flames jumped on the visitors quickly, scoring the first time they touched the football. Danny Broggin took the opening kickoff and returned it 85 yards for a score, marking the first time Liberty had returned a kickoff all the way since Aaron Hewlett scored on an 80-yard kickoff return against VMI on Nov. 7, 2009.

Gardner-Webb tied the game at 7-7 midway through the first quarter thanks to successful lengthy third-down passing plays. The first was a 36-yard strike from Chandler Browning to James Perry, III, on a third-and-four play from the 29-yard line.

Three plays later, Liberty seemingly had the Bulldogs trapped on a third-and-eight play from the Flames' 33-yard line, but Browning once again scrambled and found Jamal Patmon open in single coverage for a touchdown with 7:18 left to play in the first quarter.

The Flames were able to regain the lead six minutes later, following the first turnover of the day. Hudson Smith, moved from defensive end to starting running back due to injuries on the Bulldogs' roster, fumbled the ball away when he was struck by Doncel Bolt, marking the senior's second forced fumble of the season.

Liberty managed to get to the Gardner-Webb five-yard line, but Mike Brown's attempted pass to tight end Tommy Shaver in the end zone was broken up by Cedric McGowan. Liberty then had to settle for a 23-yard Matt Bevens field goal, staking the Flames to a 10-7 edge with 65 seconds left in the opening quarter.

The two teams traded possession back and forth until Bevens was called upon for his second field goal attempt of the game. His 39-yarder at 10:33 gave Liberty a 13-7 edge and capped off a six-play, 22-yard drive.

On the very next play, Gardner-Webb turned the ball over again, as Perry could not handle a short pass from Browning that was tipped and intercepted by Chris Mayo at the visitors' 40-yard line.

Following three short rushing gains, Brown found Chris Summers for his 13th receiving touchdown of the season. Summers, who ranks No. 1 nationally in receiving touchdowns, bested two defenders in the end zone on the 26-yard pass play, pushing Liberty's lead to 20-7 with 8:24 left before halftime.

After Gardner-Webb's fourth three-and-out series of the day, the Flames took over possession near midfield. But, for the third time during the opening 30 minutes of action Liberty's offense penetrated the red zone and could not get into the end zone. The nine-play, 44-yard drive ended on a 28-yard field goal by Bevens with 3:23 left in the second quarter.

The Flames' defense came up strong again on the next drive, as Broggin picked off his third pass of the season, giving Liberty the ball back five plays later with 76 seconds left to play in the half.

Brown managed to move the Flames quickly down the field in a two-minute offensive set, completing 5-of-6 passing attempts for 43 yards. On the final three plays of the 11-play, 49-yard drive, Brown kept the ball himself, including a two-yard burst over the right tackle to score with nine seconds left on the clock and give Liberty a 30-7 edge at the break.

The Flames nearly doubled up Gardner-Webb during the first half, finishing with 218 total offensive yards to Gardner-Webb's 118.

Brown produced most of Liberty's offense, rushing for 69 yards on 14 carries, while completing 15-of-23 passing attempts for 138 yards.

Smith and Browning carried the effort for Gardner-Webb during the opening 30 minutes. Smith rushed seven times for 32 yards. Browning was 5-of-19 for 91 yards, but was picked off two times, leading to 14 of Liberty's 30 first-half points.

The Flames were able to stop the Bulldogs on their first drive of the third quarter, while extending their margin the first time they touched the football.

Gardner-Webb elected to go for it on fourth-and-seven at their own 48-yard line, but a pass to Jules fell short.

Two 10-plus yard runs by SirChauncey Holloway (15 and 12 yards) gave Liberty first-and-goal from the 10-yard line. However, the Bulldogs once again kept Liberty from scoring a touchdown, forcing Liberty to settle for a 23-yard Bevens field goal with 8:55 left to play in the third quarter.

Both teams managed to find the end zone during the fourth quarter, starting with the visitors. Devin Johnson forced Holloway to fumble the ball away and the linebacker recovered it at Liberty six-yard line. Three plays later, John Rock kept the ball on the quarterback sneak and found the end zone on a one-yard run at 13:01.

The Flames tacked on the game's final points quickly on the ensuing drive. After a short gain by Pat Kelly on a six-yard slant over the middle of the field, Summers got free for his second score of the day, a 56-yard touchdown catch 50 seconds later to seal the win.

Liberty, who came into the game ranked No. 6 nationally by averaging 461.38 total offensive yards per game, had its third-lowest output of the season. The Flames finished the game with 396 total offensive yards, which ranks just ahead of the 395 yards against Ball State and 264 yards against James Madison.

Brown finished the game with 297 of Liberty's 396 total offensive yards, marking just the fourth time the junior has finished a game this year without crossing the 300-yard threshold. Brown came into the game ranked No. 1 nationally in total offense, averaging 334.25 yards per game.

Brown rushed 15 times for 77 yards and a touchdown, while completing 20-of-31 passes for 220 yards and two scoring passes.

Both scoring throws went to Summers, posted his fifth 100-yard game of the year by catching seven passes for 119 yards. The junior now has 14 touchdown receptions on the year with 954 receiving yards, which is already the fifth-highest single-season yardage total in program history.

The Flames held their third-straight opponent under 300 yards and fifth of the year, as Gardner-Webb finished the game with 252 total offensive yards.
