Clinical Counseling

Marriage and Family Therapists (LMFT)/Licensed Professional Counselors (LPC)
Requires state licensure
Provides billable mental health services on parity with other health services
Work in conjunction with Psychiatrists (MD), Psychiatric Nurses (PMHN),
Psychologists (LCP), and Social Workers (LCSW)

Non Clinical Counseling

Pastoral Counselors (Non-licensed)

Human Services, other helping professions (Non-licensed)

Lay Counselors (non-licensed)

Accreditation

- Regional Accreditation
 - Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS)
 - Liberty is accredited by SACS



- National Accreditation:
 - CACREP
 - Clinical mental health or Professional counseling program
 - Marriage and Family Counseling (Residential)
 - COAMFTE
 - Non-CACREP/COAMFTE, but meet regional accreditation and state standards
 - Marriage and Family Therapy (online)
 - Same course content as CACREP program, but online

MFT program

- Value of MFT degree:
 - Working with couple/families
 - Learn to apply systems theory in counseling
 - Counseling 'individuals' in a new light
 - Dual Licensure option
- Unique states requirements: <u>Link is here</u>
 - Student is responsible to stay current with state requirements
 - Some states require course work outside of the Liberty DCP
 - Liberty's MFT degree is based on VA LMFT requirements

- ... and Counseling Skills . . .
 - Application of Knowledge
 - Skills Courses (505/512)
 - Practicum
 - Search for Site when taking 512
 - Internship
 - Couple/family hours
 - VA 200/240 with couples/families
 - Supervision (Faculty and Site)

- It involves <u>Professional Behaviors</u>
 - Ability to Work Professionally
 - Conduct in Class and Field Sites
 - Adherence to Policies
 - Includes due dates, paperwork, etc.
 - Quality of Work
 - Respectful in your Interactions
 - Ethical behaviors (Code of Ethics)
 - Maintain Confidentiality

- It involves <u>Counseling Disposition</u>:
- (Awareness—Attitudes & Beliefs)
 - Emotional Regulation
 - –Manage Anxiety
 - -Resolve Conflict
 - Openness to Feedback
 - Maintain Boundaries
 - Character (Maturity)
 - Caring / Empathy
 - Self-Awareness



Professional Development: Involves the "Total Person" of the Counselor

- No other discipline requires this in quite the same way
- Developing a Counselor Identity
- Be a mature, growing person
 - Emotionally, Relationally, Professionally, and Spiritually
- The process is important: Marathon not a sprint
 - Cannot shortcut the process
 - Evaluate your time
