A Qualitative Descriptive of Best Practices Utilized by Foster Youth Support Program

Bioorganic & Medicinal Chemistry Letters

Presenter(s): Alan Fulp

Presentation Description: A library of FAAH (fatty acid amide hydrolase) and dual FAAH/MAGL (monoacylglycerol lipase) inhibitors designed for peripheral selectivity were targeted. Of these compounds, three were identified to have desirable FAAH inhibition and reduced permeability in a PAMPA (parallel artificial membrane permeability) assay. Two compounds showed activity in an ABPP (activity-based protein profiling) assay.

CORT Level Comparisons Between Allopatric and Sympatric Habitats in Plethodon Hubricti

Presenter(s): Cory Goff

Presentation Description: As part of the ASSURE program this summer, several students were involved in research collecting preliminary data on the health of an endemic salamander found separated from and in the presence of a competitive species. We collected body condition and hormones to assess their physiological health in both regions.

Current Status of Amphibian Diseases in Virginia and the Peaks of Otter Salamander

Presenter(s): Matthew Becker

Presentation Description: Virginia has a large diversity of amphibians, and several species can only be found within the state. Conservation of these endemic species is very important. This research project investigated the prevalence of three lethal diseases that threaten local amphibians, including the endemic Peaks of Otter salamander.

Detection and Extraction of PFOA and PFOS: Using Molecularly Imprinted Polymers

Presenter(s): Stephen Hobson

Presentation Description: Perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) and perfluorooctanesulfonic acid (PFOS) are toxic and persistent compounds from the production and use of fluoropolymers (e.g., Gore-Tex® and Teflon®). Resistance to environmental degradation leads to bioaccumulation and poses health risks. Presented is the synthesis and characterization of a molecularly imprinted polymer-based sensor for this application.

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Digital Scavenger Hunt

Effect of Dietary Supplements of N-Methyl-N-Nitrosourea Mediated Guanine Methylation

Presenter(s): Stephen Hobson

Presentation Description: N-methyl-N-nitrosourea (NMU) is formed in situ in the gut after the intake of foods containing nitrates. In the stomach, NMU decomposes to a methyldiazonium salt that specifically alkylates guanine at the O-6 position. Alkylation can lead to mispairing mutations linked to tumorigenesis. Presented is a screening of natural products against this process.

Monocytes as a Model for Characterizing Molecular Contributors of Amblyomma Americanum (Lone Star Tick) to Galactose-a-1,3-Galactose (α -gal) Sensitization

Presenter(s): William Moore and Davis McGuirt

Presentation Description: Alpha-gal syndrome is an IgE-mediated allergy to galactose- α -1,3-galactose. Antigen presentation being required to promote the type-1 hypersensitivity response, APCs must be required for allergen recognition. THP-1 monocytes were exposed to tick homogenate, in a dose-dependent manner, to determine its effect on monocyte differentiation/polarization. Future directions are proposed.

Motivation and Emotion Fluency Education in Psychology Curriculum

Presentation Description: Conversation on the importance of a robust psychology of motivation and emotion in psychological educational curriculum through a biblical worldview. Included is a scriptural basis for motivation and three scripture-based skill-building resources.

Nanofibrous Carbon Hybrids for Low-Cost Tailored Device Production

Presentation Description: Carbon nanomaterials hold great promise but are difficult to produce and utilize cost effectively. This project aims to overcome those challenges by using a hybrid material approach.

Nourishing Students Through Guided Undergraduate Research

Presentation Description: Each year, students in the Department of Biology & Chemistry are provided the opportunity to explore and engage in undergraduate research mentored by a faculty member. Twice Forty Years of Scholarly Pursuits: Robert Reid Howison (1820 - 1906)

Presentation Description: The written artifacts of nineteenth-century Virginian Robert Reid Howison (1820–1906) lend themselves to an analysis of Howison as a self-directed, lifelong learner, and non-traditional educator as evidenced through his scholarship stemming from his vocational roles as lawyer and minister as well as his work as a historian. Howison's autobiography provides the chronology to examine his life, situated within a tumultuous cultural milieu, and it offers insights into intellectual participation outside of an academic setting. Despite Howison's prolific career, he is largely unknown in contemporary literature; however, he is a worthy role model of independent scholarship for 21st-century educators.

Validation and Analysis of Physiological Health for the Plethodon Hubrichti Along an Elevational Gradient Presenter(s): Cory Goff

Presentation Description: For the past several semesters, I have had research students collecting hormones from an endemic salamander species found locally to assess the impacts of environmental conditions on their physiological health. We have validated the process and have started analyzing the body condition and hormone concentrations to assess health.
