One senior Department of Defense official expressed his sincere appreciation for their complex analysis while noting its contribution to their deeper understanding of the problem set. He further voiced his confidence that these future national security professionals will be more than ready to take the baton from the current generation of leaders when the time comes.

Professor Robert Cooper

Please join us at the Helms School of Government in thanking Professor Robert Cooper for his 7 years of service to Liberty University. Earlier in the spring, Professor Cooper announced that he will be retiring at the end of the spring semester.

Professor Cooper came to Liberty after serving 34 years in various posts in the Navy and Department of Defense. Robert "Coops" Cooper first enlisted in the United States Naval Reserve in 1985, received his B.S., Biology, from the University of Texas at Arlington in 1987, and subsequently reported to Aviation Officer Candidate School to become a designated Naval Flight Officer in 1991.

Lieutenant Commander Cooper served multiple tours in Japan, East Mediterranean, the Persian Gulf, and Western Pacific. He served various roles in Operations, Training, Administration, and Inspections/Evaluations. Cooper retired in 2009 with multiple Naval and Marine Corps awards, over

2,000 flight hours in 10 aircraft, and 437 carriers arrested landings "traps."

Before coming to Liberty, Professor Cooper served from 2009 to 2015 as a Senior Analyst to the Inspector General, Special Plans and Operations Directorate where he has made significant contributions to the Evaluations of US Government Efforts to Develop Afghan and Iraqi Security Forces, Afghan Air Force, Global Counter-Terrorism Operations, Battle of Wanat and the DoD Safety Program.

Professor Cooper is married to the former Alicia Scott, and they have three beautiful children and two granddaughters. We are deeply grateful for the years Professor Cooper has given to our students and to his colleagues at the Helms School. And although we will miss him here on campus in Lynchburg, we are pleased that he will continue to teach online for Liberty University going forward.
