COURSE SYLLABUS

BIBL 165

ACTS

COURSE DESCRIPTION

A study of the growth and development of the first century Church as recorded by the accurate historian, Luke. Special attention will be given to the activity of the Holy Spirit in the ministries of Peter and Paul.

RATIONALE

Students in this degree program should know the general background of the time of the Apostles, including chronology, geography, social customs, historical backgrounds, and events within the first century New Testament Church. Also, students should be aware of both specific and general issues, problems, and areas of concern that have faced Christian scholars surrounding the book of Acts, as well as the early Church as a whole.

IV. MEASURABLE LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- A. Explain the authorship, date, addressee, purpose, historicity, canonicity, and theme of Acts.
- B. Summarize the contents of Acts, on exams and in a Book Chart.
- C. Relate the history of Acts to the Pauline epistles.
- D. Explain the theological emphasis and contribution of Acts to the New Testament canon.
- E. Describe and distinguish the various ministries of the Holy Spirit within a believer (baptism, indwelling, filling).
- F. Trace the development of the major theme(s) of Acts throughout the book.

After reading the Course Syllabus and <u>Student Expectations</u>, the student will complete the related checklist found in Module/Week 1.

C. Discussion Board Forums (3)

Discussion boards are collaborative learning experiences. Therefore, the student is required to participate in each Discussion Board Forum by posting a 300-word thread in response to the instructor's prompt. The student is also required to submit 200-word replies to 2 other classmates' threads.

D. Research Paper

The student is required to write a 6–8-page research paper addressing a topic from the list of approved topics provided in the course. The paper must incorporate at least 6 scholarly sources, which must be formatted in correct, current Turabian style and be accompanied by a properly formatted title page, table of contents, and bibliography. These elements are not included in the required page count. This paper has 3 stages of submission: an Outline with Thesis Statement, Information Preparation, and the Research Paper Final Submission (including the revised bibliography and outline). Each stage of the Research Paper must be submitted through SafeAssign.

E. Thematic Analysis Essays (3)

The student will write 3 essays in which he/she analyzes the thematic development in each of the 3 broad movements of the book of Acts (chapters 1–7, 8–12, and 13–28). More detailed guidance is given in the instructions for each of the 3 essays.

F. Quizzes (4)

The student will complete 4 open-book/open-notes quizzes. Each quiz will contain 25 multiple-choice, true/false, matching, and/or fill-in-the-blank questions. Additionally, each quiz will be timed with a 50-minute time limit and a penalty for each minute over the time limit.
