HISTORY OF WESTERN CIVILIZATION I

COURSE DESCRIPTION

A survey of the major currents in Western civilization from its beginnings in the ancient Near East to 1648.

RATIONALE

This survey course introduces students to political, economic, military, religious, and cultural developments of the ancient, medieval, and early modern periods that constitute the foundation for the modern West. It is a required prerequisite for upper-level courses in European history, and it may also fulfill a portion of the General Education requirement.

VI. COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND ASSIGNMENTS

After reading the Course Syllabus and <u>Student Expectations</u>, the student will complete the related checklist found in Module 1.

C. Class Introductions (1)

During the first week, the student will post an introductory post for the class. This is an informal assignment counting for 2 participation points, for students to get to know each other and their instructor.

D. Discussion Board Forums (2)

The student will participate in two different forums by writing an initial thread of 300-400 words in response to the assigned topic. The student will then participate in discussion of the topic by posting a minimum of 2 responses, either to 2 different threads, or in combination with responding to questions/comments on his or her own thread. Responses will be a minimum of 100 words with no maximum. Forums will be open the entire week, and students are encouraged to participate throughout the time they are open. In addition to general comparison/contrast, students will be provided with opportunity for specific Biblical evaluation of historical topics. Further details on requirements and grading are provided in the course.

E. Evaluative Essays (2)

The student will write two essays on a chosen topic, reading and evaluating assigned sources in light of Scripture. The essays will be 750-1100 words, written in Turabian formatting, and submitted to Blackboard in Weeks 4 and 7. For the first essay, students will also submit a thesis statement for review. Further details on requirements and grading are provided in the course.

F. Chapter Quizzes (15)

The student will take timed quizzes covering the content of the course textbook. Each quiz consists of 20 multiple-choice questions. There is a 40-minute time limit, and 2 attempts will be permitted with the higher grade counting for the final score in Blackboard.

G. Lecture Quizzes (8)

The student will take timed, weekly lecture quizzes that cover all lectures within the module folder. Each quiz consists of 10 multiple choice questions. There is a 20-minute time limit for each quiz and only 1 attempt will be allowed for these quizzes.
