NURS 767

TRANSITION TO NURSE EDUCATOR ROLE

COURSE DESCRIPTION

In this precepted practicum, students will engage in the development and deliverance of classroom, laboratory, and clinical teaching assignments in nursing. Students will integrate philosophical foundations, educational theory, and nursing knowledge to promote active learning.

RATIONALE

This course will prepare the graduate nurse for a role in nursing education. This course will discuss transition to the role of nurse educator. This course will also cover essential concepts necessary for effective teaching either in the academic setting or as an educator in the healthcare setting.

V. COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND ASSIGNMENTS

After reading the Course Syllabus and [Student Expectations](#), the student will complete the related checklist found in Module/Week 1.
- C. Discussion Board Forums (6)
Discussion boards are collaborative learning experiences. Therefore, the student is required to create a thread in response to the provided prompt for each forum. Each thread will be graded on the depth and breadth of discussion. In addition to the thread, the student is required to reply to 2 other classmates' threads. Each reply must be robust and make substantial contributions to the overall discussion. Any supporting sources must be cited in current APA format.
- D. Written Assignments (5)
The student will complete 5 written assignments. Each assignment must be approximately 5 pages (not including the title and reference pages) and must be in current APA format. Each assignment must include a sufficient number of resources to be able to answer the questions posed.
- E. Practicum Goals and Objectives
The student will write a list of goals and objectives for his/her practicum experience for this course. Once final approval is given by the instructor, the student will also submit a copy of the approved final version of the goals and objectives in the Typhon practicum site as a Microsoft Word attachment and provide a copy to his/her preceptor prior to the start of practicum hours. The student will be given 5 hours toward his/her practicum hours for completing the Practicum Goals and Objectives.

F. Practicum Logs (3)

Throughout the course, the student will complete an in-depth practicum log in Typhon. The log is to be comprehensive in the details related to the experiences in the field. The discussion must be in-depth and analytical with examples as to how the student has applied the NLN competencies as well as the readings from the textbook and professional literature in the practicum setting.

Note: In addition to accruing the required number of practicum hours, there must be a passing grade for the practicum experience. This includes progression with the student's established goals and objectives, an in-depth documentation of the practicum experiences as evidenced in the clinical log, and satisfactory preceptor evaluations. Failure to pass the practicum requirements will result in failure of the course.

G. Clinical Faculty Role Development Paper

The student will write a 7–10-page (excluding the title page and reference page) research-based paper in current APA format that focuses on the faculty's role in the clinical setting. The paper must include at least 5 references in addition to the course textbooks and the Bible.

H. Preceptor Evaluation

The preceptor will complete an evaluation of the student at the end of the practicum experience. The evaluation will be sent electronically over a secured server through Typhon to the preceptor. The instructor will retain the preceptor evaluation and may review the evaluation with the student upon request.
