OTCL 620

HEBREW SYNTAX

COURSE DESCRIPTION

A study of Hebrew tools and syntactical principles that will serve as guides to sound exegetical procedure. (Formerly OTCL 530)

RATIONALE

As a continuation of OTCL 520, this course attempts to offer a more in-depth examination of the Hebrew verbal system. Furthermore, it attempts to do so in a manner that aids the student in retaining the information and skills gained for future usage.

Each thread must be at least 400 words and demonstrate course-related knowledge. In addition to the thread, the student is required to reply to 2 other classmates' threads. Each reply must be at least 200 words. (MLO: A, B, C, D)

D. Workbook Assignments (20)

The student will complete 20 assignments from the workbook that apply the concepts from the chapter readings. (MLO: A, B, C, D)

E. Quizzes (5)

Each quiz will cover the Reading & Study material for the module/week in which it is assigned. The student will be allowed 2 attempts for each quiz. Each quiz will be closed-book/closed-notes, contain 5–25 true/false and multiple-choice questions, and have a 30-minute time limit. (MLO: A, B, D)

F. Exams (3)

Each exam will cover the Reading & Study material for the modules/weeks in which it is assigned. Each exam will be closed-book/closed-notes; contain 50 true/false, multiple-answer, multiple-choice, and short answer questions; and have a 1-hour time limit. (MLO: A, B, C, D, E)
